Guest speakers include Mrs. Winifred Hathaway, associate director of the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness, who will discuss sight-saving programs; W. Harold Bleakley, rehabilitation agent for the blind, Pennsylvania Department of Labor and Industry, who will demonstrate the Hayes-Binet examination; and Mrs. Leversia L. Powers, Pennsylvania Department of Public Instruction.
