At home the Fund provides health aids such as visiting nurses, clinics, and hospitals; children's aid in vocational training, health work, recreational programs, and aid to the aged, disabled, and indigent.

Agences desiring to be included in the National War Fund must be approved by the President's War Relief Control Board. After inclusion they are required by law to file statements of expenses and collections, but there is no government participation in the management of the Fund or of its cam-

Member agencies at present are United Service Organizations, United Seamen's Service, War Prisoners' Aid, Russian War Relief. United China Relief, British War Relief Society, Greek War Relief Association, Polish War Relief, Friends of Luxembourg, French Relief Fund, United Yugoslav Relief Fund, Belgian War Relief Society, United Czechoslovak Relief, Queen Wilhelmina Fund, Norwegian Relief, Refugee Relief

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
