

## Panhel Accepts Rush Code; Silent Periods End January 3

Pan-Hellenic Council, at its Tuesday night meeting, corrected and accepted its code for this semester's sorority rushing, announced Martha E. James, Council president.

As a prelude to the open rushing period which begins January 3, Pan-Hellenic Council will sponsor a tea for all interested freshmen and a designated number of fraternity women. This mixer will be held in an Atherlon Hall lounge from 2:30 to 4:30 p.m., November 27. No pins will be worn at this function which will serve merely to acquaint freshmen with fraternity-minded women.

Two open houses will be held by each sorority so that freshmen can better identify the sorority women with their houses. No personal invitations may be issued, but freshmen may visit whichever houses they wish from 2:00 to 3:00 p.m., December 4 and 18.

The strict silent period now being observed will first be broken when the open rushing period for intensive daytime dating starts 8 a.m., January 3. This period extends until 5:30 p.m. January 8. Sunday, January 9, will be silent, with open rushing resumed from January 10 to 13. No dates may be kept before 8 a.m. or after 5:30 p.m. during these periods.

In the period of January 10 to 13 each fraternity will schedule two rushing parties from 7:30 to 9 p.m. Invitations will be handled through the Pan-Hellenic post office at Student Union. All invitations must be answered but only one per evening may be accepted.

Strict silent periods will be enforced on the following dates: Sunday, January 9; Friday, January 14; Saturday, January 15 until 2 p.m. and after 5:30 p.m., and Sunday January 16 until 7 p.m.

The sororities' part in rushing ends with two formal coffee hours from 1:30-3:00 p.m. and 3:30-5:00 p.m. Saturday January 15. Bids to these affairs will be delivered to freshmen after 9 p.m., January 13, and must be answered by written acceptance or refusal, which must be in the Pan-Hellenic post office by 4:45 p.m. January 14.

Preferential ballots will be de-

livered to rushees Sunday morning, January 16. These ballots must be filled out and returned to the Dean of Women's office by 1 p.m. of the same day. Each fraternity will notify its new pledges.

No woman may be initiated into a fraternity unless she has an all-college average of .1. The rushing code condensed above pertains to freshmen and transfers only; there is open bidding at all times during the college year for "women who have been registered in the college for two semesters, except at vacation time, during the formal rushing period, and the two weeks following the last day of the formal rushing period."

The money for the scholarships was taken from the receipts of the annual WRA dance. Aside from the \$150 given as scholarships, WRA gave \$100 to Mrs. Hetzel's fund.

and nurseries; establishment and maintenance of emergency kitchens; health aids to women war workers; and the sending of seeds for replanting of scorched earth areas in the United Nations.

At home the Fund provides health aids such as visiting nurses, clinics, and hospitals; children's aid in vocational training, health work, recreational programs, and aid to the aged, disabled, and indigent.

Agencies desiring to be included in the National War Fund must be approved by the President's War Relief Control Board. After inclusion they are required by law to file statements of expenses and collections, but there is no government participation in the management of the Fund or of its campaigns.

Member agencies at present are United Service Organizations, United Seamen's Service, War Prisoners' Aid, Russian War Relief, United China Relief, British War Relief Society, Greek War Relief Association, Polish War Relief, Friends of Luxembourg, French Relief Fund, United Yugoslav Relief Fund, Belgian War Relief Society, United Czechoslovak Relief, Queen Wilhelmina Fund, Norwegian Relief, Refugee Relief Trustees.

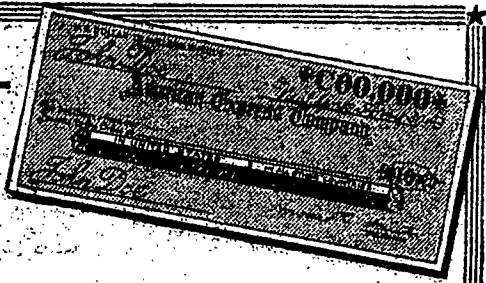
