

Ag Professor Surveys Farm Labor Situation

Dr. W. E. Keeper of the department of agricultural economics at the College is conducting a study of the impact of the past year of war upon the farm labor situation in Pennsylvania. The study will supplement an earlier report covering the period from October, 1940, through September, 1942.

Some of the same farmers in the 19 counties formerly surveyed will be interviewed again in the present investigation. This follow-up study should provide clues to recent changes in the labor force, changes in sizes and kinds of farm enterprises, operator's plans for the following year, and other adjustments which farmers have had to make because of prevailing labor conditions.

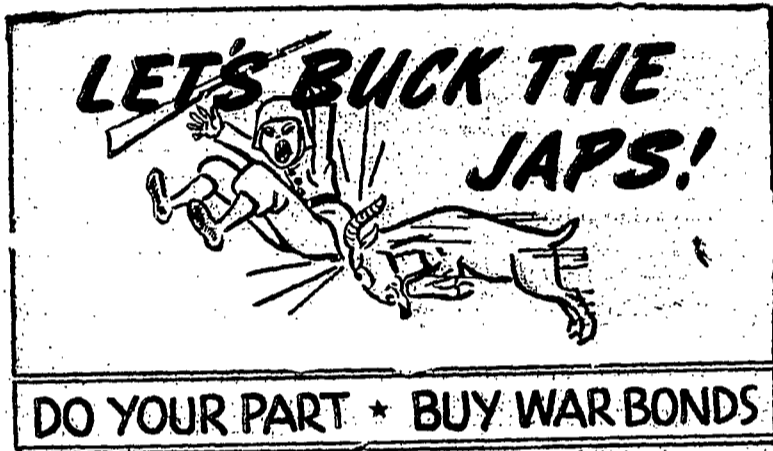
