Frosh Coeds Discuss 'World Police Force' In First Annual Debate

Penn State's freshman women's debate squad met State College high school's team in the freshmen's first regularly scheduled debate of the year, 7 p.m. last night, announced Dr. Clayton Schug, debate coach.

This year's intercollegiate question, which was debated last night, is, Resolved: United States should cooperate in establishing and maintaining an international police force upon the defeat of the Axis.

The meet was divided into two non-decision debates. The first affirmative team for the 7 o'clock debate session included Edna Dent, first constructive speaker; Irene Smulzenski, second constructive speaker, and Carmita Cameron, cross-examiner.

Dr. Smith Suggests Psychology Course For Fighting Men

A widespread adaptation of the Nazi troop indoctrination technique to American standards was proposed here today as "the one direct, sure method of keeping homesickness and low morale away from our fighting men."

The proposal was made by Dr. Kinsley Smith, who has instituted a special course in war psychology for both the military trainees and civilian students at the College.

The psychology professor believes that special sessions should be conducted for servicemen on exactly what the enemy is like, what he believes, what he hates, and what he hopes to accomplish.

The Germans have been doing it for years, he pointed out, and though lies and misrepresentations have been their chief weapons, the results have been powerful. He proposes adopting the Nazi's general pattern of instruction—but substituting straight-from-the-shoulder facts for the lies and half-lies.

"Our morale is good now," Dr. Smith explained, "but like any fighting weapon, it can be improved and fortified for the future."

The American is fighting today, the Penn State professor reasoned, because he appreciates his homeland and his freedom, and has a vague notion that it's better than the Nazi governmental system.

"Make him more aware," he suggests, "that he is away from home to perform the only job that can make his home safe from Axis oppression, and give him accurate information about what the enemy wants that oppression to be like, and you'll have an army of fighting men armored against homesickness and low morale under any and all conditions."
