

Selective Service Rules Defer 10,000 Students

(Continued from Page One) accordance with which occupational deferments may be granted to undergraduate students in certain scientific and specialized fields, and undergraduate students in preprofessional courses of study.

(3) Undergraduate students who will graduate after July 1, 1944. An undergraduate student in any of the scientific and specialized fields listed in this paragraph who will graduate after July 1, 1944, should be considered for occupational deferment if he is a full-time student in good standing in a recognized college or university and if it is certified as follows:

(a) By the institution that he is an undergraduate student majoring in one of the scientific and specialized fields listed in this paragraph and that he gives promise of the successful completion of his course of study;

(b) By the institution that if he continues his progress he will graduate within 24 months from the date of certification; and

(c) By the National Roster of Scientific and Specialized Personnel of the War Manpower Commission that the certification of the institution as to his course of study and competence and as to

his prospective date of completion is correct to the best of its knowledge and belief, and that his deferment, if granted, will be within the national quota for such students

- Chemistry
- Engineering
- Geology
- Geophysics
- Physics

Students deferred to graduate on or before July 1, 1944, and students deferred for reasons other than pursuing a course of study will not be counted against the national quota of 10,000.

Pre-medical students will be deferred on precisely the same terms except that in their case it must be further certified that they have been accepted at a medical school.

Regulations now in effect, namely, that students must be within 24 months of graduation and in good scholastic standing when certified for deferment, remain unchanged.

Graduates of the above mentioned specialized fields are also eligible for a further 30-day period of deferment after graduation in order to become established in a job in a war industry.

Men Debaters Prepare To Encounter Columbia, NYU in New York City

Rapidly swinging into their full schedule of activities, the College's debating units take to the road for contests in Shippensburg and New York.

Entered Saturday in the debate tournament at the Shippensburg State Teachers College are the men's and women's debate squads.

Next week, two debaters will entrain for New York to participate in contests with Columbia and Washington Square College, a division of New York University.

The two students, Zelmar Barson and Louis Ullman, will match their abilities with two Columbia University delegates. The contest, to be broadcast over radio station WNYC, will show Penn State holding down the negative. The question is: "Resolved, That the American Party System, as in use today, be abolished."

Two days later, this men's squad will engage Washington Square College on the year's national debate question, "Resolved, That the United States should cooperate in establishing and maintaining an international police force upon defeat of the Axis." Penn State will defend the affirmative viewpoint.

That evening the men's debate team will encounter the Columbia squad, this time on the subject, "Resolved, That the voting age be lowered to eighteen years."

Five teams are tied for first place in the league, each having won two games and losing none. The bks 12, 28, 46, 42, and 17 temporarily hold this distinction. Bks 7 has won two and lost one.

Fencing Off

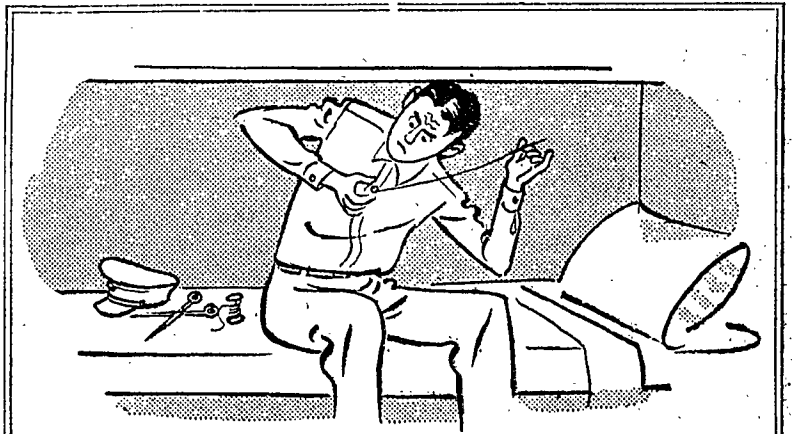


