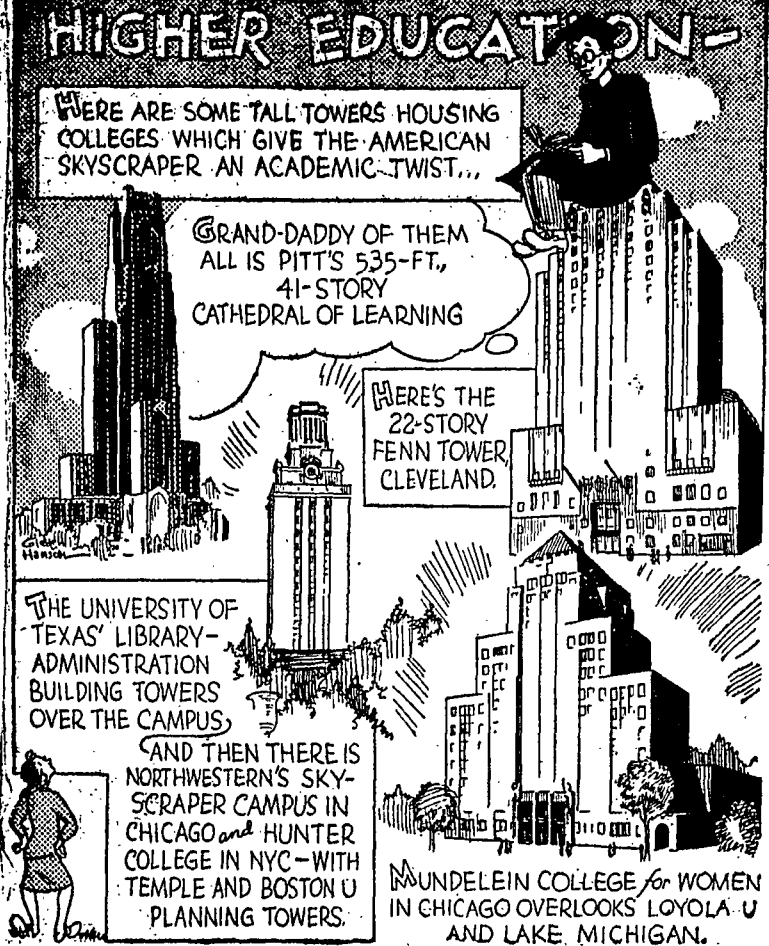
GRAND-DADDY OF THEM ALL IS PITT'S 535-FT., 41-STORY CATHEDRAL OF LEARNING

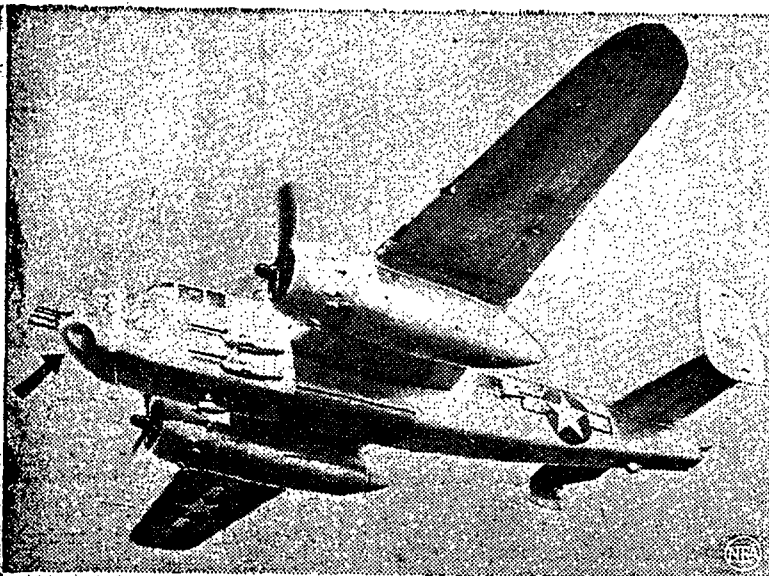

'Unfair,' Says PFC



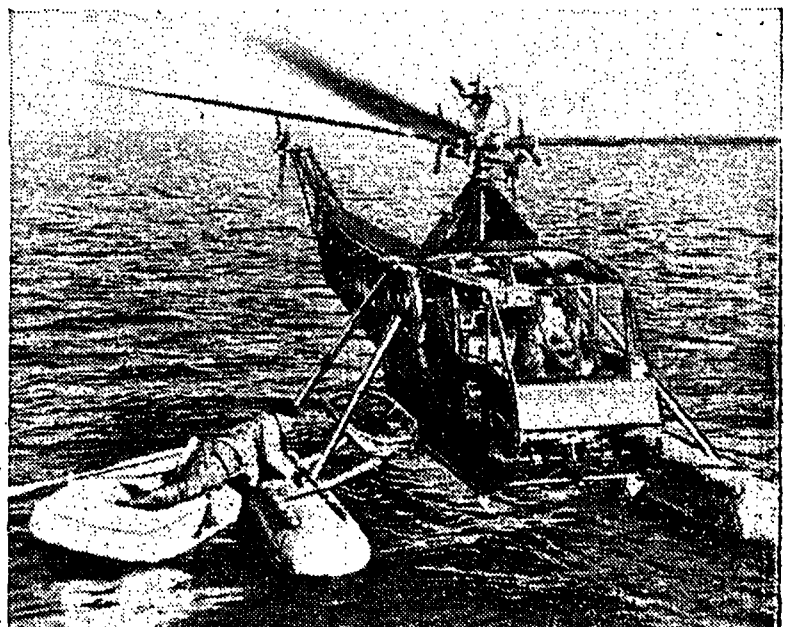

Heavy Work on Foot

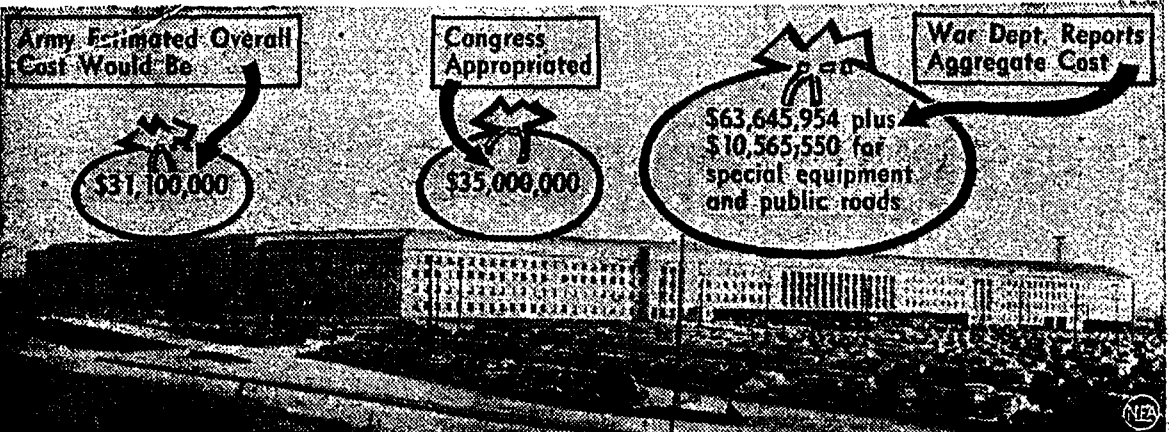

'Water Bug' to the Rescue



The helicopter, widely plugged as the post-war family air jalopy, has already been tested and found practicable by the Coast Guard as a means of rescue. Shown in demonstration by the Third Naval District's USCG Air Arm, "water-bug-like" copter settles near "wounded" man on life raft. Breezy-but-safe basket attached to fuselage is for the extra passenger.



The pictograph above shows the Army's gigantic Pentagon building, across the Potomac from Washington, with figures indicating the difference between the cost, as originally estimated and the actual expense involved in the building, whose five sides extend almost a mile, houses some 10,000 workers.
