Graduating seniors will meet in front of Sparks building in their caps and gowns at 2:40 p.m. Thursday, October 19, and proceed at 2:55 p.m. to Schwab auditorium for commencement exercises, announced Dr. Clarence E. Bullinger, chairman of the committee of public occasions.

Those faculty members participating in the academic procession will assemble along the walk on the south side of Schwab auditorium at 2:45 p.m. and move promptly at 3 p.m.
