On the water, however, the story is different. Sweeping closer and closer to Tokio, carrier-based planes have hit the Ryukyu Islands, only two hundred miles from Japan. The Japanese also report that American bombers have struck at Formosa. This story is not substantiated by the Navy Department. In the East Indies, a force of Liberators plastered the rich oil center of Balikpapan, on the east coast of Borneo. That this raid cost seven bombers is some evidence that the Japanese are not exactly vanquished in the Pacific.

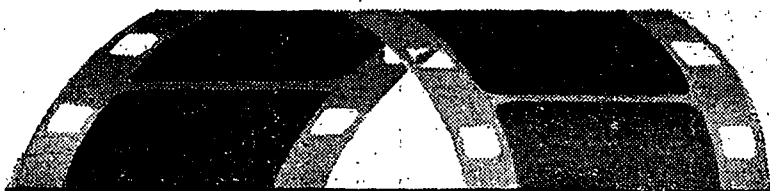

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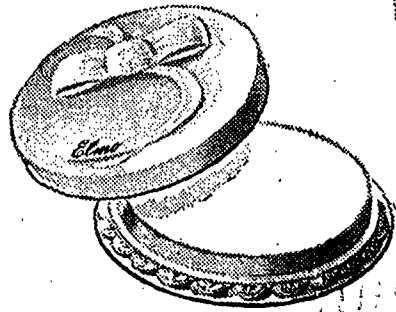
