Library Receives Memorial Gifts

The College Library recently received a gift of books and newspapers from W. H. Nesbit of Milton as a memorial to Joseph N. G. Nesbit, who graduated in engineering from the College with the degrees of E. E. in 1904 and M. E. in 1908.

Among the books of especial value and interest are many early Pennsylvania imprints. The collection includes books on foreign relations, biographies of American pioneers, Bibles or parts of Bibles and religious books, a gift book, and other items. The newspapers include miscellaneous numbeis of "The Stars and Stripes" and "Trench and Camp" which were issued during World War I by American units in the war.

Another gift to the College Library by an anonymous donor includes a number of special issues of the Philadelphia Inquirer, published during the Civil War, and a copy of the Philadelphia Evening Bulletin dated September 7, 1901, relating to McKinley's assașsination.


WSGA Requests Coeds to Conserve College Fuel
