Marquardt, College Examiner, Observes Silver Anniversary

Dr. Carl E. Marquardt celebrated his 25th anniversary as College Examiner on Tuesday. The day also marked the silver anniversary of the establishment of that position at the College.

During his first year as examiner, Dr. Marquardt considered about 100 applications from students who wished to transfer to the College, and granted 79. In the last year before the College began to operate on the accelerated program, he considered 3,000 applications including those requesting admission to the Graduate School.

Before the office of College Examiner was established, transfer students were required to see heads of various departments in order to have their credits from other institutions evaluated.

Students who had taken 15 subjects at other colleges were required to see the heads of 15 departments before college status could be determined. Now the office of the college examiner evaluates all transfer students' credits.

7. A program of all student mixers will be formulated and will be sponsored by the Cabinet.
8. We shall, however, be unable to accomplish this program unless we have the cooperation and support of you the student voters.

Dr. Marquardt came to the College as professor of German in 1909. As College Examiner, he is an ex-officio member of the committee on Academic Standards. At the present time, he is serving as chairman of this committee.

150 New Army Trainees Raise ASTP Total To 405

Arrival of 155 new trainees, 110 of whom are 17-year-old reservists, boosted to 405 the total enrolled in the Army Specialized Training Program at the College.

Forty-five of the newcomers came from infantry replacement centers for engineering instruction, while the 17-year-olds will pursue a course in basic engineering until their 18th birthdays, when they will be assigned to Army camps for basic training.

Since this program was first inaugurated at the College three years ago, approximately 2700 young men have received instruction in basic and advanced engineering. The vast majority have been enrolled in the basic course.
