Tribunal and Judicial are the and Joan Schearrer. judiciary boards that try men and women students respectively for violation of regulations set by All-College Cabinet or Women's Student Government Association.

Tribunal is composed of eight men students, all appointed by the Cabinet chairman with the approval of Cabinet. Two of the members are eighth semester, and the rest are chosen from the fifth, fixth, and seventh semester classes. Chairman of Tribunal is also appointed by Cabinet.

The committee has the power to punish any man student found guilty of breaking customs or rules set by Cabinet and to investigate charges of conduct detrimental to the College. Penalties for violations can include expulsion if the action is serious enough to warrant it. Tribunal meets every Wednesday night, and tries from 5 to 20 cases during the eveming.

Dr. Tietz Leaves For Dept. of Agriculture Dr. H. M. Tietz, associate pro

fessor of zoology at the College, has been granted a leave of absence to work with the bureau of entomology and plant quarantine, United States Department of Agriculture.

He has been assigned to the United States National Museum. Smithsonian Institute, Washington, D. C., where he will arrange and classify a group of noctuid moths.

The project was instigated at the request of the Surgeon General's Office which is concerned with disease-transmitting and crop-infesting insects being brought into the States-many of them on airplanes from South America, Australia, and New Zealand.

Dr. Tietz, who served as assist ant entomologist for the Department of Agriculture from 1924 to 1926, will be on leave from the College from July 1 to September

Yale Prof Speaks Dr. Halford E. Luccock, profes-

sor homiletics at Yale University Divinity School, will address the Chapel congregation on "Sleeping Through a Revolution" in Schwab Auditorium, Sunday.

Before accepting his present post in 1928, the 60-year-old clergyman served as contributing editor for the Christian Advocate and as editorial secretary for the Methodist Board of Foreign Missions. He is a former instructor at Hartford Theological Seminary and registrar and instructor in the New Testament at Drew Theological Seminary, Madison, N. J. He has also served as pastor in a Windsor, Conn., church and in St. Andrew's Church, New Haven, Conn.

Dr. Luccock is a graduate of Northwestern University. He has done graduate work at Union Theological Seminary, Columbia University, Syracuse University, Al-legheny College, Wesleyan University, and the University of Vermont. In 1910, he was ordained into the ministry. He is a member of the Sigma Chi fraternity.
