All-College president were suggested from the floor. The representatives believed that the entire student body should elect a president who would perform the duties of Cabinet chairman. Under the present system the eighth semester president automatically becomes chairman.

The Penn State Christian Association and the Women's Recreational Association were added to the list of ex-officio members of Cabinet in another change proposed by the Constitution Revision committee.

Mary Faloon, seventh semester president, said that Judicial and Tribunal would be able to function more smoothly if a Student Regulations Committee was established. The purpose of this group would be to make rules governing the social conduct of all students connected with the College.

On this committee there would be two representatives—one man and one woman—from each semester. The dean of men, the dean of women, and the All-College vice president, or president, would complete the board.

Cabinet also heard the report of Gw Newton, chairman of the Keep Off the Grass committee, who stated that a campaign will be staged beginning Monday to keep students off the grass. Signs will also be erected at bare spots on the campus. Newton asks all students to cooperate in the drive by walking on the sidewalks and not across the lawns.

William Morton, chairman of the Swing Inn committee, announced that Swing Inn will be open to the public in the Armory tonight.

The Elections Code was approved as read by Chairman Helen Hutton of the Elections committee.

Such a lend-lease program, according to the professor, would serve as a "major means of overthrowing bias, bigotry, and prejudice. The schools are strategic and decisive—if abused, they will get us into trouble, but they can perpetuate peace."

In explaining his plan, Dr. Champlin says, "We will not force ourselves upon these countries, but be glad to be invited. The smart people will want to know about us, as our educational system is so highly rated."

The damage Hitler has done to the schools, he believes, will be lessened because there are enough good Germans gradually being released who will be available for the reorganization of Germany's schools.
