versities and for the states of Georgia, Missouri, and Virginia.

In addition, he has made ("exceptional contributions") to the Society for the Promotion of Engineering Education, having served on numerous committees, as president and vice-president, and as a member of the Council.

From 1924 to 1927, he was associate director of the Investigation of Engineering Education, then in progress under the Board of Investigation and Coordination. In 1927 he organized the Society's summer schools for engineering teachers and acted as their director until 1933.

He has served as chairman of the Committee on Aims and Scope of Engineering Education, as chairman of the Committee on Engineering Education after the War, and is now chairman of the Division on Humanistic Social Studies.

In the work of the Engineers Council for Professional Development, Dean Hammond has served as chairman, vice-chairman, Committee on Engineering and a member of the Inter-Schools, as chairman of the Delegatory Committee for New England, and is now chairman of the Sub-Committee on Technical Institutes.

He has published numerous papers and reports on engineering education, principally in the Journal of Engineering Education and in the publication of the American Society of Civil Engineers. In particular, the committee reports on the Aims and Scope of Engineering Education and Engineering Education after the War, to which as chairman, he made the greatest contribution, are considered landmarks destined to guide its development for a long time.

During the present war, he has served on the national advisory committee, Engineering, Science, and Management War Training Program, of the civilian advisory board to the Military Training Division, Army Ordnance De-

partment, and coordinator of the committees of academic visitors, Army Specialized Training Program, Third Service Command.

Dr. Hammond is the second dean of the School of Engineering to receive the medal. It was also awarded to Dr. Robert Lemuel Sackett in 1933.

Ag Supervisors Confer At College

The School of Agriculture will be host to the annual conference of the County Supervisors of Vocational Agriculture, Monday through Thursday.

The program, which is being arranged by the Department of Agricultural Education, will include a series of short talks to present the findings and practical applications of current research in the Agricultural Experiment Station. F. F. Linsinger, Station Director, will introduce the specialists.

One full day will be devoted to discussions of agricultural cooperatives in Pennsylvania. J. K. Stern, of the department of agricultural economics, has invited representatives of a dozen or more of the leading cooperatives to discuss their programs of buying, handling, grading and selling agricultural materials.

A feature of the conference will be the State Future Farmers of America Public Speaking contest, which will be held in 100 Hort, 1:30 p.m. Monday. One high school orator from each of the supervisory areas is eligible to speak on an agricultural topic. College staff members will act as judges.

The winner of this State contest will compete in the North Atlantic regional contest at Springfield, Mass. The winner there will represent the region in the national contest at Kansas City when the F.F.A. convene there in October in connection with the American Royal Livestock Show.

Folkers To Speak On Vitamin B-6

Dr. Karl Folkers, Assistant Director of Research for Merck and Company, will speak at the 131st meeting of the American Chemical Society, in Room 119 New Physics at 7:30 o'clock tonight. His topic will be "Recent Investigations on Vitamin B-6."

Dr. Folkers received his undergraduate training at the University of Illinois, Ph.D. degree at University of Wisconsin, and post doctorate training at Yale University. Since 1934 he has been a research chemist in the laboratories of Merck and Company and since 1938 he has been Assistant Director of Research.

Among honors received by Dr. Folkers is the American Chemical Society Award in 1941. In 1940 he was co-recipient of the Mead Johnson and Company award.

His principle published research work has dealt with the isolation and structure of Erythrina alkaloids, the isolation and synthesis of pyridoxine, the synthesis of biotin and pantothenic acid and derivatives of morphine and pyrimidine.

Dr. Folkers will discuss new developments in the chemistry of pyridoxine, based on cooperative research carried on in five laboratories during 1944 and 1945.

Capt. Ferguson Aids In Restoration Of Aircraft

Capt. George W. Ferguson, '42, stationed at an Eighth Air Force Service Command Station in Belgium, is a member of the service team that puts battle-damaged bombers and fighter planes back into combat after they have force-landed on the Continent.

This depot was once a Luftwaffe air field, but now serves as a supply and repair base, a refueling point, and as an emergency landing field for battle planes returning from long missions over Germany.

As maintenance control and engineering officer, Captain Ferguson has aided in the depot's achievement of restoring more than 600 combat aircraft to combat after they were forced down on the Continent. He also serves as test pilot, giving aircraft their first flight after repairs have been made.

A graduate of Eddystone High School, Eddystone, and a holder of a BS degree from the College, Captain Ferguson was called to active duty from the infantry reserve in May, 1942. He was a member of Tau Kappa Epsilon fraternity and the Scabbard and Blade.

Library Features Historical Maps

An exhibit of early Pennsylvania maps is on display at the College Library, and will continue through the month of June. These maps are from the collection in the reference department of the library, and include originals of the State of Pennsylvania and the City of Philadelphia for as early as 1776.

A facsimile of the map of Pennsylvania conceived and issued by William Penn for the promotion of interest in his colony is displayed, the original printing having been made in London in 1681. There are several maps published by U. S. Tanner of Philadelphia which show canal, steamboat, railroad and coach routes in the State, one being a pocket map given to the Library by the late Prof. W. V. Runkle, former College Librarian.

S. A. Mitchell, who devoted his life to preparing maps, textbooks and geographical manuals, is represented by a number of works in the exhibit. There are four small original maps issued by the famous Carey and Lea Company of Philadelphia, which show the development of Pennsylvania from 1796 to 1813.

The first British map of Pennsylvania, prepared by Jedidiah Morse, "Father of American Geography" is shown.

Also in the lobby of the Library is a selection of books given to the Library by W. H. Nesbit in memory of N. C. Nesbit, a graduate of the College in 1904. Among the group, which includes works on a variety of subjects, is James Monroe's "A View of the conduct of the executive in the foreign affairs of the United States" printed in Philadelphia.

Lutheran Students Bury House for Recreation

The Lutheran Student Association has been authorized by the Central Pennsylvania Synod to purchase the house next to Grace Lutheran Church on College avenue for a student center.

The new building, which will be erected in the future, will contain a game room and gymnasium in the basement, a pastor's study, meditation room, worship room, lounges, and libraries, as well as overnight accommodations for alumni.

In the meantime, Rev. Edworthy Korte, student pastor, and his family will live there, and the house will be open to students at all times.
