Two more collections are scheduled for the Penn State Postwar Clothing Drive, one Thursday and the other, October 11. On these days members of Senate of Women's Student Government Association and volunteers from All-College Cabinet, Interfraternity Council, and Independent Student Council will gather the garments from dormitories and town houses, and will transport them to Grange Dormitory to be sorted and packed.

Members of the Penn State Christian Association have placed boxes for further collections at the headquarters of the various religious organizations. Fraternities have assigned the delivery of their old clothes to Grange as one of the many duties of pledges.

Men living in small town units and townpeople are urged by Shirley Kruman, chairman of the drive, to take their contributions to the nearest religious organization or to a nearby independent house where pick-up cars will call.

Independent collection stations include: Beaver House, 329 E. Beaver avenue; Cody Manor, 301 S. Allen street; Foster Lodge, 257 S. Pugh street; International House, southeast corner of Fairmount avenue and Locust Lane; Penn Haven, 315 S. Allen street; Penn Way, 228 S. Allen street; 216 W. College avenue.

According to the committee, all types of clothing are needed. Items needed are shoes, socks, underwear, summer clothes, and winter attire. The only stipulation is that the clothes be clean.

## Committee On Elections Reports Code Revision

At a recent meeting the Elections Committee of All-College Cabinet revised the student elections code effective next semester.

The committee added to the code the right of the Navy ROTC to vote and run for office under the same regulations as student personnel.

It was decided a student cannot be put up for nomination on more than one party in one semester. For example, a person cannot be nominated on one party, lose, and then be nominated again on another party.

Elections committee, candidates for office, and clique chairmen must meet ten days before elections when the code will be discussed and complaints aired. At this time a list of candidates for office and clique members must be handed in. Any changes must be approved by chairmen of elections board.

The restriction of the use of a public address system for campaigning purposes was deleted.

Dr. Carroll D. Champlin, professor of education and psychology, will address the PSCA Upperclass Club in 304 Old Main at 7:30 p.m. Thursday on "Pre-Requisites to World Peace."

Dr. Champlin has just returned from New York and Washington and has a wide background of study and travel. He has been in Europe, Puerto Rico, South America, and Canada, and has written numerous articles dealing with outstanding social and cultural problems. He will spend a considerable part of 1946 in Europe studying the effect of the war on schools.

## 'No Need To Fight Fire, Prevent It'—Haswell

"There's no need to fight the fire you prevent," pointed out J. R. Haswell, extension agricultural engineer, as he urged every farm family in the state to join in observing National Fire Prevention Week, October 7 to 13.

Emphasizing that farm fires exacted a toll of \$90,000,000 in property loss and 3,500 lives last year, he says Fire Prevention Week is a good time to inspect the entire farm premises and remove hazards. At the same time he urged such fire prevention measures as farm ponds, hand extinguishers properly loaded, ladders conveniently placed, and contact with an organized fire department.

With numerous farmers planning to remodel or construct new farm homes and buildings, the engineer stressed the importance of fire safety. Fully 50 per cent of rural fire losses can be attributed to faulty construction, he said.
