reorganized on the basis of competitive try-outs. The College choir, mixed singing group, which performs each week at the College chapel service, and the Treble Singers, reorganized last year under the direction of Prof. Guy Woods, will start rehearsals in the next few weeks.

The Blue Band organized in an informal way at the beginning of the football season and will continue as it is now until the end of the season. When the Blue Band is no longer needed the concert unit of the band will be chosen by competitive examinations.

The symphony orchestra, normally an organization of 70 pieces, will also resume its activities under the direction of Professor Fishburn.

Freshmen are eligible for all the musical organizations which are in operation. These include the ones mentioned above, plus the ROTC band. In all cases membership is based on competitive try-outs, the time and place of which will be announced in a later issue of Collegian and on the music department bulletin board in Carnegie Hall.

Rules Given for Frosh Coeds

Once again freshmen come to campus and add a little more green to the environment with their green bows and dinks. But in addition to customs, freshmen coeds are known for breaking track records when it's 9:14 and they have to be in at 9:15.

All freshmen will have a three-week no dating period, during which the only communication they will have with members of the opposite sex will be one hello per person. Anything more than hello will be considered a date and the offender will be subject to punishment by Jud!

Freshmen women must be in the dormitory at 9:15 every night except Friday and Saturday when they may have 9:30's. This rule will be enforced only during the three-week no dating period, after which the frosh coeds will be allowed one ten o'clock and one

one o'clock, to be used interchangeably. They will be permitted to date three times each weekend, Friday and Saturday nights and Sunday until 5:30 p.m.

Once a month freshmen women will be allowed a special ten o'clock but this permission is not to be used for dating. They may associate with men on and off campus only until 5:30, following the three-week no dating period, and must sign out for all dates, indicating the hour of departure and destination, and sign in upon return.

Special permissions will be granted to freshmen women for big weekends, but no members of the upper classes has the privilege to grant immunities to freshmen women.

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Rohrbeck To Serve With College Editors Group

Edwin H. Rohrbeck, agricultural editor of the College, has been elected a member of the executive committee of the American Association of Agricultural College Editors for 1945-6.

Rohrbeck previously served in the same capacity in 1929-30. In 1932 he was elected vice-president of the association and in the absence of the president, Charles D. Byrne, of Oregon, he presided at the annual meeting held at the University of Illinois in 1933. Two years later he was chairman of the program committee for the meeting held at Cornell University.

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
