

Senators Nominate Frosh Candidates; Plan Mass Meeting

Senate members nominated Joan Fox, Janet Lyons, Alethea Pottiger, and Betty Lou Reed as candidates for freshman senator of WSGA Tuesday night.

WSGA and WRA will hold a joint mass meeting for all first semester coeds in 105 White Hall at 6:30 p.m. Monday at which first semester coeds may nominate six more candidates from the floor for freshman senator. Qualifications of each nominee must be presented to WSGA upon nomination.

Coeds nominated for this post will have no judicial record, possess the qualities of leadership, and an interest in the College and its activities, and show willingness to take part in WSGA activities, WSGA President Florence Porter announced today. Nomination committee included Mary Jane Doerner, chairman, Ann Berkeheimer, and Helen Reid.

WRA will nominate two freshman representatives.

Voting will be held in the first floor lounge of Old Main, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. December 18 and 19 for both freshman senator and WSGA representatives.

Judicial head Joan Scheerer announced at the WSGA meeting that all first semester coeds must wear customs when attending basketball games. They will not be allowed to date for the games and must return to their dormitories by 9:15 p.m.

In announcing the Council's decision, Panhel President Priscilla Wagner stated that the fee will be kept in the treasury for the single purpose of covering the expense of registration. The purpose of the fee, according to Miss Wagner, is to discourage girls who "go along for a good time" and never have

any intention of joining a sorority.

Panhellenic Council voted to publish immediately the amounts of the fees and the total expense of registration. Any balance in the treasury from the registration fees will be given to a scholarship fund, the Council decided.

The date for registration will be set at next Tuesday's meeting, Miss Wagner announced. She said that it would be at the beginning of the spring semester so that girls who do not have the required all-college average of 1 will not register.
