

College Buys Property Unfit For Military Use

Clay pigeons in carload lots, machine rooms, minimum 150 dozen, 15,000 parachutes declared unfit for military use—these and similar offers come to the office of Harold Loman, purchasing agent and director of dormitories and dining commons.

Recently elected county director for Federal Surplus Distribution, Mr. Loman makes a distinction between surplus and excess property.

"Excess property," he said, "is that which may be located at an ordnance plant, naval station, government plant, airfield, or army camp, and which, according to the commander of the outfit, is not needed at that time."

"Surplus property, however," Mr. Loman emphasized "is declared as such by the surplus property board after the excess property is not found useful in camps or plants where it previously came into disuse."

The College began its purchases of excess property in the summer of 1945 after the federal government had set up a procedure whereby educational institutions were permitted to acquire excess property on a donation basis after the request had been approved by the State Department of Public Instruction

and the Pre-Induction Training Headquarters of the 3rd Service Command. The claimant merely pays costs of handling and transportation.

"In purchasing surplus property," Mr. Loman pointed out, "the College will be allowed to acquire both capital and producer property and consumer property at 'fair value' less 40 per cent discount."

Hunting knives, minimum order 75 dozen, hundreds of trucks from the Boulder Dam construction, enough property to equip a hospital—these are the surplus property offers which Mr. Loman receives.

"Catalogues listing items which are available on this basis are expected momentarily," concluded Mr. Loman, "and ample publicity will be given this matter as soon as the notices are received."
