Men Reign At Bucknell

The Penn State campus isn't the only one flooded with men this semester. Right next door at Bucknell University, a record-breaking enrollment of 1589 students was reached this term. Half of this number are veterans.

Of the 750 veterans now attending classes, 13 are women. Included in the group are approximately 350 men who left Bucknell to enter military service and are now resuming their studies.

The majority of the veterans now enrolled came in at the start of the March term, and 281 of them entered as freshmen. Once again the men outnumber the women on the campus.

Bucknell's current enrollment, largest in her 100-year history, is composed of 908 men and 681 women. Normally, the University enrolls only 1300 students.

Pitt Appoints Longenecker Dean Of Graduate School

Dr. Herbert E. Longenecker, a graduate of the College in 1933, has been appointed Dean of the Graduate School at the University of Pittsburgh.

Receiving his B.S. degree in 1933, Dr. Longenecker returned to the College for his graduate work and received his Doctor's degree in 1936. He joined the Pitt faculty as a Senior-Research Fellow in 1933 and participated in research of The Buhl research project in biochemistry, which eventually developed into the division of Research in the Natural Sciences.

His early research interests at Pitt were an extension of work on the constitution and metabolism of fats undertaken as a post-doctorate National Research Fellow in England, Germany and Canada during 1936-38. In 1942 he was advanced to a full professorship in chemistry and was given the direction of the Buhl Foundation research project in the Natural Sciences.

During the war years, Dr.

Longenecker served with the Food and Nutrition Board of the National Research Council. He has also been active in the organization of the committee on food research of the Military Planning Division, Office of the Quartermaster General, and has acted as the coordinator of a nation-wide research program on the deterioration of fats in foods set up as one of the committee's major projects. He has also been an advisor to the Army Medical Nutrition Laboratory of the Surgeon General's office.

Dr. Longenecker is a member of the Pittsburgh Chemists' Club and the American Chemical Society. He was president of the former group in 1943-44. In civilian defense he was chief of the Food Committee for Allegheny County and has served as a member of the Pittsburgh Red Cross Committee on Nutrition. He is also a member of the Chemists' Club of New York, the New York Academy of Sciences and the American Society of Biological Chemists.

He is scientific editor of "Fats, Oils And Detergents," an abstract service to researchers in the fat and oil field; on the editorial board of the journal of the American Oil Chemists' Society, and a member of the editorial board of a research monograph series on fats and oils.

While an undergraduate student, Dr. Longenecker was President of Interfraternity Council, president of Phi Lambda Upsilon, president of Phi Mu Alpha, and a member of Lions Paw, Skull and Bones, Student Council, Student Board, Alpha Zeta, Thespians, Glee Club, Band, Student Union, Intra-Mural Board, class secretary, and vice-president of the Liebig Chemical Society.
