### Red Cross Ends Drive With Dance

Climaxing three weeks of intensive soliciting will be the informal Red Cross Benefit Dance at Recreation Hall 9 to 12 Saturday night with Dick Berge and his orchestra. Tickets will be on sale for \$1.50 a couple, tax included.

All organizations which have not yet turned in their contributions to the drive are asked to do so on or before Sunday to Carol Dickman, Kappa Alpha Theta house or Walter "Jinx" Falkenberg, Chi Phi house.

### Group Asks Froth Revival

A petition to reestablish Froth, campus humor magazine, was considered by the Senate Committee on Student Welfare at its meeting Tuesday. The committee voted to give tentative approval to the petition and to authorize the group to proceed with a permanent organization.

The petition, signed by 16 students, requested approval of a new constitution, "To set up a corporate body, with a continuing responsible adult membership in the majority, similar to the Collegian corporation, and to start Froth off from a new pattern."

The petitioners also stated that the new Froth corporation would be willing to assume any financial obligation incurred by the pre-war publication.

Organizational plans and the completion of a constitution will be discussed in 417 Old Main, 7 p. m. Tuesday.

A general call for candidates will not be issued until the Senate Committee on Student Welfare has had the opportunity to consider reorganization plans and pass on them.

The Committee requested that the permanent plan include a requirement for a review of all copy by the Faculty Adviser before its publication in any issue of the magazine.

### Kerner to Play At 'Bunny Hop'

"Bunny Hop," All-College semi-formal dance, will be held in Recreation Hall from 9 to 12 p. m. on April 6. Andy Kirner and his 15-piece band from Lancaster will provide the music. Tickets will cost \$2.40 tax included.

### Key Captures 8 Offices; Nittany-Independents' 6

Vaughn Stapleton, Nittany-Independent, swept the All-College presidential elections this week with a count of 1383 votes, more than twice that of his Key opponent, Walter Falkenberg.

Stapleton's running mate, Rebecca Walker, captured the All-College secretary post, defeating June First, Key, by 226 ballots.

The Key party pulled through in the semester elections, however, by placing four presidents and four secretaries, as compared with three presidents and three secretaries for Nittany-Independent.

A total of 2,006 students voted in the elections Tuesday and Wednesday, which is approximately 40% of the student body.

### The Elections Committee,

headed by Charles Appleman, docked three votes from the Key party, and one from the Nittany-Independent party before the ballots were tabulated. Key's votes were docked for using a car to campaign on campus while Nittany-Independent's offense was campaigning in Old Main on the day of elections.

Joseph Steel, Key, was elected president of the eighth semester by a count of 134 votes to 80 for Robert Burge. In the ballot for secretary, Nittany-Independent Marilyn Globisch defeated Jean Bosch, Key, by a margin of 13 votes.

Key kept the lead in the seventh semester by placing James Sheehan as president and Patricia Trester, secretary. Losing candidates on the Nittany-Independent ticket were John Nolan and Nan Charles.

Sixth semester voters registered a margin of 42 ballots in favor of Charles Willing, Nittany-Independent, for president, over William Brooks, Key. The closest vote in the elections was recorded in the secretarial post as Doris Handwerk, Key, eked out three votes over Barbara Wilson, Nittany-Independent.

Again in the fifth semester count, Key won both posts, as Robert MacGregor defeated William Christmas, Nittany-Independent, and Janet Mollenaur was favored over Nonnie Cooper, Nittany-Independent.

In the fourth semester Key came out on top with Thomas Lannen elected president and Suzanne Romig, secretary. Losing candidates on the Nittany-Independent card were William Wagner and Geraldine Maley.

Third semesters voted a straight Nittany-Independent ticket to place Theodore LeFevre as president and Alice Miller as secretary. Key contestants were William Schreyer and Mary Magas.

Charles Hill, Nittany-Independent, registered the largest landslide of the elections to defeat his Key opponent for second semester president, Pete Nastase, 338-91. Hill's running mate, Ruth Hemmler, swamped the Key contestant, Florence Elderton.

### Students Pay Semester Fees

Fees for the 1946 Spring Semester are due to be paid in Recreation Hall from 9 a. m. to 5 o'clock continuously today.

Bursar Russell E. Clark announced that graduate and special student whose fees did not exceed \$10 and had paid their \$10 advance deposit fee need not go to Recreation Hall but may call at the Bursar's office early in the week for refund checks.

Lists of matriculation numbers will be posted in panels with the net amount due from each student opposite his number. Seats are provided where students may make out their checks for the correct amount. The check or cash with the matriculation card should be presented at the correct cashier's window. There will be ten windows arranged according to matriculation number. The center window will be for those who have previously applied for deferments.

"A representative of the billing office will be available in case of adjustments," said Bursar Clark. There is a \$5 penalty for late payment.

### Dr. A. O. Morse Attends Educators' Convention

Dr. A. O. Morse assistant to President Hetzel in charge of resident instruction represented the College at a Harrisburg meeting on Tuesday called to discuss the possibility of Indiantown Gap and New Cumberland as sites for temporary colleges.

At the meeting of Pennsylvania educators headed by Gov. Edward Martin the plan was discussed to accommodate veterans who have been unable to matriculate in regular colleges because of a lack of housing and to assure high school students an opportunity of higher education.
