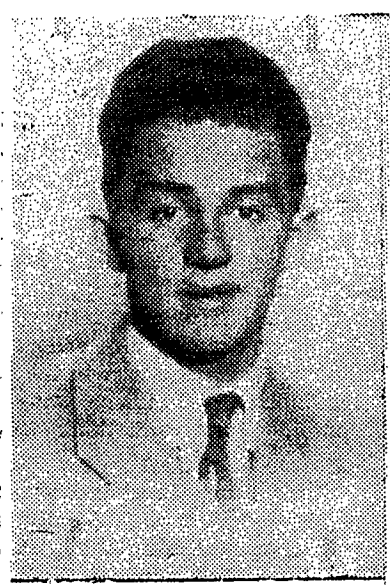
The Wanderer

Jo Sinclair's WASTELAND (Harper's, \$2.50) was awarded Harper's \$10,000 prize which is given every two years. The problems of our atomic age might be solved a little easier if we used more horse sense and our natures were as unselfish and contained as much good will as Sayward's in Conrad Richter's THE FIELDS (Knopf, \$2.50.) Another prizewinner, Doubleday and M. G. M. for a grand total of \$145,000. It's a good yarn and worth reading if only to see Huntington and Altona in print . . . Our nomination for one of the Fifty Best Books of the Year goes to Holt for the beautiful job on THE LOST LANDSCAPE by Winifred Welles—\$3.00. It's an ideal Easter gift for mother or grandmother, or for anyone who loves to hold the very stuff of the American past in their hands . . .
