Pint Sized Library Of Technical Books

"Pint-sized" is the word for the library of the Ordnance Research Laboratory.

Two hundred and fifteen books covering a variety of subjects including mathematics. physics, chemistry, photography, and mechanics are in constant circulation, and news books arrive each week. In addition, the library keeps on hand numerous technical magazines and pamphlets.

The most important function of the library, however, is to catalogue and file documents sent from other research organizations and the memoranda written by Ordnance research workers. To date, almost 800 such documents and several thousand memoranda are filed.

The filing system for the memoranda, an improved variation of the system used at Harvard Underwater Sound Laboratory, was devised by Eric A. Walker, director of the laboratory, as a result of his experience in organizing the files at HUSL.
