The occasion of this outburst of beef is the sale of 75 head of pure-bred Aberdeen-Angus heifers at the Beef Cattle Barn at 1 p.m. Saturday. This will be the first auction held by the College at which unfitted heifers are to be sold in lots of two, three or four cows—thus the half ton or




