Wins 100-220 yd. Dashes

On Saturday afternoon Barney Ewell ran two of the most brilliant races of his colorful career. The ex-Penn State star in dazzling penformances broke two Mid-dle Atlantic A.A.U. records by dashing 100-yards in 9.7 seconds and winning the 220-yard dash by


a ten yard margin in 2111 seconds. The time for the 220-yard dash is the world's fastest mark for the 220 on a curved track. Whether it will be accepted as the new mark will be decided by the NAAU Records Committee. A strong wind was blowing at the runners' backs in the 220-yard, as it was for the 100yard dash.

If this new world record is accepted it will mark the third such crown for Ewell. He holds the honors in the 50-yard dash at 5.11 seconds and is co-holder of the crown in the 60-yard dash in 6.11 seconds


