Tanger Started Career \ As Grade-School Teacher

Dr. Jacob aTnger, who retired from the College faculty on June 30 as professor and head of the department of political science with emeritus rank, didn't start his career as a college instructor nor as a teacher of political science.

But after completing the course at Millersville State Teachers College in 1899, he taught in the public schools of Lancaster and Dauphin Counties for eight years.

"In those days we didn't teach one subject, or even one grade. We taught one school," Dr. Tanger recalls.

Dr. Tanger entered Frank-Lancaster in 1907 and receiv- ciation, says. ed the degree of bachelor of philosophy in 1909. He then accepted a position as instructor in English at Carnegie Institute of Technology. He went to the University of Pennsylvania in 1910, where he took graduate work and became an instructor in political

"I always was interested in political science," Dr. Tanger says, "and when they needed an instructor and offered me an opporturnity, I accepted.

Dr. Tanger earned his doctor of philosophy degree at the University of Pennsylvania in 1915 and came to Penn State in 1916 as instructor in political science. In 1940, when the department of history and political science was divided into two departments, he was named head of the department of political science.

(History, political science, sociology, and economics comprised one department and occupied one office in 1916, Dr. Tanger recalls.

During the 36 years that Dr Tanger has been teaching political science, he has seen the rise and fall of numerous "isms." He believes that the threats poised to our democracy by communism, fascism, and socialism, make us more conscious of the need for understanding and learning to operate our democratic system.

Dr. Tanger also has noted durting his years of studying and teaching political science, a constantly growing interest in both local and national government. This, he feels, is largely the result of two World Wars and the subsequent schemes and devices for making possible peaceful relations among nations.

Dr. Tanger enjoys an occasional deep sea fishing trip as one of his hobbies and, as might be expeoted of a native of Lancaster "Garden Spot of Amercounty, ica," he takes an interest in home gardening.

State College will continue to be the home of Dr. Tanger and he hasn't made any definite plans for the future.

"I don't want to make any rash promises as to what I'm going to do," Dr. Tanger, who recently
