Merle Miller, noted young author, magazine editor, and newspaper correspondent, will be guest speaker at a public meeting in Schwab Auditorium, 7:30 p.m. Friday, October 4th. The topic Mr. Miller, former editor of the Army Magazine *YANK*, will discuss is "Veterans of Two Wars."
 The program, which is being sponsored by the Penn State Branch of the American Veterans Committee, will also feature a half hour of music by Sonny Roy and his orchestra.
 On behalf of the AVC, Ed Banyai, its local chairman, today extended a cordial invitation to all students, faculty and townspeople to attend.
 "Because of his excellent background, I think that Merle Miller will be especially interesting for veterans to hear," Banyai added.
 "Though only 28 years old, Miller has already written two well-known books, "Island 49," and "We dropped the A-Bomb" and was executive editor of all *YANK'S* 14 editions.
 Now an editor of a new national magazine project as yet in the

pre-publication stage, Mr. Miller is also a member of the Board of Directors of Americans United for World Government and is one of the founders and member of the National Planning Committee of the AVC.

 passed their 21st birthday before July 1, 1946; be enrolled in good standing at the College; be morally qualified, by character and personality, to be a Naval officer; and have had less than two semesters of college work. Married men are not eligible.
Sophomores Eligible
 Since freshmen at the College will not be attending classes on the campus this Fall, provision has been made to admit men of sophomore standing to the NROTC program. Before they are eligible, however, they must plan to spend two extra semesters here in order that they can complete the eight semesters of NROTC training.
 Veterans may be admitted to the program with advanced standing, provided they are able to pass examinations that will prove their training in the service is the equivalent to certain Naval Science courses. They may not be more than 25 years of age on July 1 of the year of prospective graduation.
Ex-NROTCers Expected
 The classes for the Fall semester, Capt. McGarry explained, will be composed of these sophomores and of former Navy ROTC students who were discharged from the service and will enroll at Penn State as civilians. Approximately 100 of these students who formerly were enrolled at the College are expected to return.
 The eight-semester NROTC program includes the following courses: introduction to naval science; naval communications and ship control; ordnance and fire control (two semesters); celestial navigation and piloting; advanced navigation and tactics; naval engineering; and internal combustion engines and ship construction and stability.

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 courses and will receive training that is not practicable or advisable on the campus.
 Since physically qualified young men who have not had service in the armed forces are still eligible for call under the Selective Service Act, it is expected that the advanced courses in R. O. T. C. this fall will be filled with veterans who have returned to the campus. Men who have had at least one year of active duty in other than a commissioned status, are eligible for the advanced courses, provided they are otherwise qualified.
