ROTC Changes Age Limits

Colonel Ben-Hur Chastaine has announced that age requirements for advanced ROTC have been changed so that more students may be eligible for the course. The age limit is now "not more Dian 27 years of age with a minimum age of 14 years." means that students who have successfully completed the basic NOTIC course, or have the equivalent military service, are now cligible for the advanced course ROTC if they are between the ages of 14 and 27.

If a student graduates before the age of 21, he receives a military certificate of elegibility until he attains the age of 21 at which time a commission as Secand Lieutenant, Reserve is automatically granted.
