

Rabbi To Speak At Chapel

Dr. Morris S. Lazaron, Rabbi, who with two other clergymen flew to England in 1941 to observe the British under fire, will relate his many and varied experiences when he speaks on "England Revisited" at Chapel services in Schwab Auditorium at 11:00 Sunday.

Dr. Lazaron, who is a member of the Executive Board of the National Conference of Jews and Christians, is at present Rabbi of the Baltimore Hebrew Congregation, Baltimore, Maryland.

In view of his "great contribution over the years to religious thought and to spiritual wealth of the nation," Rutgers University, in June 1936, conferred the Degree of Doctor of Letters upon him, honoris causa.

He was ordained on June 10,

1914, and his first pulpit was in Wheeling, West Virginia, from August 1914 to August 1915. He was

then called to his present charge. He made his flight to England in the fall of 1941 with Dr. Everett R.

Clinchy and the Reverend Father Vincent C. Donovan.

the European Theater of Operations, DiMaria was one of a hundred registered officials. Most of the referees didn't arrive at the first basketball tournament held in Oran, however, and Orlando had to officiate 36 games in 5 days.

DiMaria set a record for basketball officiating when he handled the European Theatre Championship Finals in Florence, Italy in 1946. Eight referees were scheduled for the games but only Orlando and Danny Bottera of Pittsburgh, Kansas showed up. Consequently, Orlando had to referee ten games the first day and five the second.

Said the April 6, 1944 edition of Stars and Stripes:

"No penalty was declared without Di Maria explaining in motions exactly what had happened. Sometimes he sounded like a tobacco auctioneer, more often, though, he looked like the leading player in an opera."

Orlando said that he may referee here at Penn State but doesn't think he'll have the time.
