WASHINGTON—President Truman spent one hour and 45 minutes last night closeted with top level officials in an attempt to solve the nation's number one problem: the meat shortage.

The White House session was the fourth of the week and the second yesterday.

The huddle over meat followed a news conference at which Mr. Truman's most significant statement was "No."

At that time, the President said no immediate White House action is contemplated to solve the meat shortage.

NEW MEXICO—At White Sands, a German V-2 rocket was fired 102 miles high yesterday. The armed forces calculated the rocket's speed at 36 hundred miles an hour. It was aloft for 11 minutes. Special devices were attached to slow the descent.

PORTUGAL—The Portuguese government cut off Lisbon communications and took drastic steps against rumored moves toward revolution. Lisbon heard one story that a young Portuguese army officer harangued a group of cavalrymen into what he called a "March to glory to conquer freedom." The North Portugal revolt didn't last long—militarized police persuaded the insurgents to surrender.

BERLIN—The Allied Control Council at Berlin rejected all clemency pleas of 16 convicted top Nazi war criminals. The council also confirmed that 11 of the men sentenced at Nuernberg will be hanged next Wednesday.

RUSSIA—A Soviet accusation featured the day's doings at the Paris Peace Conference where the American and British delegates pleaded for free navigation of the Danube. The Soviets countered with an accusation that what they termed "dollar democracies" are seeking to further imperialistic ambitions. Meanwhile, delegates began voting on a Romanian treaty.

Campus-Key members meet in 10 Sparks while the Nittany-Independents will be in 121 Sparks.

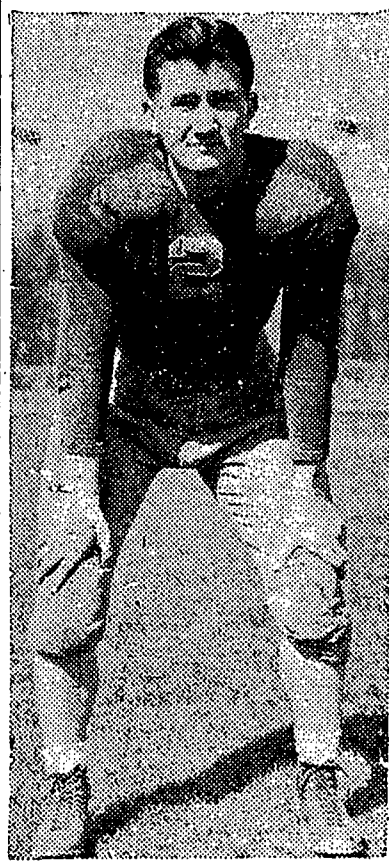
Only those clique members who were present last Sunday at the preliminary nomination meetings and signed the registration cards will be eligible to vote in the final nominations.

Livestock Judging Team Competes in Four-College Contest at Ohio State

Eight students have been selected to represent the College at a four-college contest to be held at Columbus, Ohio, October 11 and 12 in a revival of livestock judging after five years. Those selected are: Carolyn Graham, Mary Louise Waygood, H. Leigh Woehling, Samuel W. Laub, D. B. Stauffer, Dorsey O. Phillips, Ross E. Christian, and Charles W. Cameron.

The livestock students will compete with similar teams from Purdue University, University of Kentucky, and Ohio State University.

Accompanying the team will be Dr. William L. Henning, of the animal husbandry faculty, who said contests will include judging of horses, beef cattle, sheep and swine. Dr. Henning indicated he will use the showings made by individuals of the local delegation to determine the team to represent the College in intercollegiate judging at the American Royal Livestock Show at Kansas City, Mo., October 19.

During the trip to Columbus, the students will stop at the farms of C. A. Smith, Chester, W. Va., a prominent livestock breeder, to judge Hereford cattle.

Lions Travel To Syracuse

The Nittany Lions load into two buses this morning to go to Syracuse where they will take on "Biggie" Munn's Orange in Archbold Stadium at 8 o'clock tomorrow evening.

Coach Bob Higgins is taking his charges to Syracuse a day early in order to work them out under the lights, and to insure that they have plenty of rest before meeting the rejuvenated Orange eleven.

Tomorrow's game will bring together many of the same players who participated in the 1942 contest. The Lions came from behind twice to take that game by an 13 to 13 margin.

Chief Lion nemesis will be Captain Dick Whitesell who hasn't played for Syracuse this year because of a pre-season injury.

The Penn State-Syracuse football game tomorrow evening will be broadcast by WMAJ through the facilities of the Atlantic network.

The "Big" believes that he will be in shape for the Penn State fray. Whitesell was the shifty runner who, in 1942, raced 75 yards to score the first touchdown against the Blue and White.

During the past few evenings, the squad has been trying out various defenses in an effort to combat the deceptive Syracuse offense which operates from a T-formation and then winds up in a single wing thrust.

"Biggie" Munn who is in his first year as head coach has been emphasizing work on his big but inexperienced line. The last time Syracuse whipped Penn State was in 1937 (19 to 13) when Munn was the Orange line tutor.

Panhellenic Announces Policy On Open Rushing For Fall Semester

Open rushing has been decided upon by the Panhellenic Council as the policy for the fall semester. There will be no registration as there was for rushing last year.

For nine weeks there will be free association, except for overnights, following which bids may go into the Dean of Women's Office at any time.

Girls eligible are those who were on campus up to and including the spring semester of 1946 and having an All-College average of one or better.

President Florence Ratschford also announced that girls whose pledgeships had expired but who have since met the requirements may be repledged at any time during the semester by their respective sororities if their nationals permit.

Two issues are yet to be decided. One is whether or not open-bidding shall continue for the first of the spring semester under the present regulations. Second, shall a policy of open rushing be continued, and if it is will it include those girls who have been on campus for only one semester?
