

Dean Submits New LA Plan

A plan for revamping the lower division curriculum of the Liberal Arts School in keeping with changes already instituted by some of the country's outstanding colleges has been sent to the department heads for their approval. Dr. Ben Euwema, dean of liberal arts at the College, announced yesterday.

The proposed revision in curriculum drafted by the Liberal Arts Student Planning Committee (appointed by the all-college cabinet last spring) involves a well-defined program of study for the first two years in the L. A. School and recommends the creation of a Liberal Arts Student Council. Dr. Euwema said he thought these provisions would improve the liberal arts setup at the College.

Dean Euwema, former head of English and director of languages and literature at Mich. State College, has been at the college since September 9 and considers the campus one of the most beautiful he has even seen. He also commented about the friendliness of the people in State College and said he thought he would enjoy being here.

Before serving with the Michigan State faculty, Dr. Euwema spent eight years at Westminster College. Professor Wm. W. Hamilton of the speech department and Mrs. Guest of the psychology department were students there at the time, he declared.

Dr. Euwema is now living with his family on South Patterson street in the house formerly occupied by Dr. Glenn.

Saturday afternoon Phi Delta Theta entertained their sister fraternity, Delta Gamma at an informal party and Alpha Tau Omega entertained Kappa Alpha Theta at a buffet supper Wednesday.

Dr. Walker Off To London To Consult With British

Dr. Eric A. Walker, head of the department of electrical engineering and Director of the Naval Ordnance Research Laboratory at the College, has been chosen as one member of a party of four research experts that will leave by plane Monday morning for London to act as a connecting link in the naval ordnance activities of Britain and the United States.

Visiting Portsmouth, Glasgow and London, at the invitation of the British Admiralty, the party will consult with British naval and civilian research and production experts in the course of a two-week tour.

The other men on the four-man civilian-Navy team are Captain O. E. Livdahl USN of the research branch of the Bureau of Ordnance, Captain R. Hottel, production division of the Bureau of Ordnance, and Dr. Robert Knapp of California Institute of Technology, who was in charge of the hydrodynamics laboratory at that college during the war.

Trip to Cambridge

In addition to visiting these three cities, Dr. Walker will make a special trip to Cambridge, England where he will talk with a group that maintains a radar receiving station there. This station is the counterpart of the transmitter atop the Naval Research Laboratory on our campus. Our transmitter sends out high frequency radio waves which are picked up by the receiver in England. A second receiver, midway between State College and Cambridge, England, is located at Cambridge, Massachusetts.

Dr. Walker graduated from Harvard in 1932. He received his S.M. in engineering in 1933 and his Sc. D. in engineering in 1935, both from Harvard. He was born in Long Eaton, England in 1910.
