struction in its newly rebuilt and repaired buildings in September, with about 1000 students. Some of the buildings had been destroyed in an RAF bombing raid when they housed the Gestapo.

The student dormitories and the beautiful ball-room in the administration building were especially impressive. Constructed of the typical yellow brick in units of three "colleges," the dormitories have a sumptuous appearance, inside as well as out.

Fifty students are accommodated in spacious single rooms, each having a large window and a private balcony, equipped with a flower box. A typical room contained, in addition to the usual study and living equipment, a coffee table and three easy chairs, paintings, busts and small statuary (nudes, naturally), and several vases of flowers. The rent is—five, yes, five dollars a month!

A high-ceilinged, diamond-shaped ball room with the ends sliced off for a ceiling-high, twenty-foot-wide window at one end, and glass doors at the other,

would have sent a Student Union enthusiast into fits of admiration, envy, and an even stronger desire to further his project. Magnificence is the only word capable of describing the acoustically perfect room, which is flanked on its long sides by comfortable couches, strikingly upholstered with black and white Holstein veal hides.

Located near the ceiling is a balcony for the orchestra. Lighting for the musicians is so placed that it is practically invisible to the dancers. General illumination emanates from two rows of modernistic metal Chinese lanterns, suspended from overhead by 30-foot link chains. To complete the wonder of a Penn Stater were at least a dozen large, convenient check rooms at strategic positions throughout the building.

The Museum of Natural History must be one of the most popular buildings on campus. It houses complete and artistically arranged specimens in many fields of science and nature, from insects to prehistoric fossils. From the partisan Penn State viewpoint, it was noted with relief that their displays of minerals were less extensive than those in our Mineral

Industries building, but in other realms, they had it.

After a day crowded with interesting and enlightening observations, this reporter left Aarhus University with a deep and favorable impression of the Danes—their spirit, their friendliness, and the obvious respect which they have for Americans.
