Twenty-two state teachers colleges, undergraquate centers and cooperating colleges today are accomodating 2969 Penn State freshmen, according to latest figures released by William S. Hoffman. registrar of The College.

Included in this group, who will transfer to the College next fall as sophomores, are 2497 male students and 472 coeds. The largest group of students, 1025 are enrolled in the lower division. Enrolled in the engineering curricu-Jum are 912 students, in agriculture 421, in chemistry and physics 334, in physical education 98, in education 93, and in mineral industries 86.

The registrar's records show that 13 state teachers colleges, four undergraduate centers, four so-called cooperating colleges and Mount Alto are giving Penn State men and women their first year of

The largest group of State undergraduates is at the Altoona Undergraduate Center-433. The 243 students at Edinboro make it tops in enrollment among the state teachers colleges.

An item revealed by the statistics on freshmen is that there are 40 women in chemistry and physics, five women in engineering and two women enrolled in mincral industries.
