

AXSigs, DU Triumph To Open IM Swimming

Upsilon decisively triumphed over their opposition as the College Intramural Swimming Program plunged into its opening schedule Monday afternoon at the Glennland pool.

Alpha Chi Sigs overcame their Phi Delta Theta opponents 27-13. Sweeping four of the five events, AXS completely swamped their rival. Victories were scored by Yeagley in the 60-yard freestyle, Wilhelm in the 60-yard breaststroke, Seavy in the diving, and the relay team in the final feature 120 race. Sole win for the Phi Delts was Fife's 60-yard backstroke feat.

First places by Lambda Chi Alphas Eble and Watson were insufficient as DU came back strong in the last two events to win 23-14. DU Earnshaw backstroked his way to victory in the fine time of 46.8 seconds. Diving and relay wins were also earned by Delta Upsilon.

Point scores were based upon five for the winner, three for second place, and one for those showing. Relay winners were awarded five points, with the losers receiving nothing.

Four dual meets will take place this afternoon with the first competition slated for 4:30 p.m. Delta Chi vs. Beta Sigma Rho, Alpha Sigma Delta vs. Theta Xi, Kappa Sigma vs. Delta Beta Tau, and Phi Kappa Sigma vs. Alpha Zeta will be the competitive assignments.

Lions Meet Rams For First Time

Marking the half-way point on the Nittany Lion schedule, Penn State and Fordham University meet for the first time on the gridiron at New Beaver Field on Saturday.

One of the first colleges to cancel varsity football as its players went to war, the Rams returned to the gridiron this fall with a new head coach, Ed Danowski of Fordham and New York Giants fame.

Danowski, an advocate of the T-formation, will be back at the helm after a one week absence because of an emergency appendectomy.

Close to a score of former wearers of the Maroon, headed by co-captains Jim Lansing and Joe Andrejco, returned from the services to furnish the elements of a fairly strong first team.

But, since Fordham did not field a team in 1943, 1944 and 1945, it has not nearly an experienced a squad as most universities of its size.

Andrejco, of Hazleton, made a brilliant record at the tight halfback slot as one of the famed touchdown twins when Fordham won the Sugar Bowl Championship on New Years Day in 1942.

At right end will be Jim Lansing who was named All-American for his performance with the 1941 championship eleven which was awarded the Lambert Trophy as the outstanding team in the East.

The Rams opened their season by dropping a close 8 to 7 decision to Georgetown. The following week the powerful Galloping

Diehl To Coach

Lion Swimming Team

Lenny Diehl will coach Penn State's swimming team this season, replacing Robert E. Galbraith, who is busy as faculty counselor for veterans. Lenny is highly recommended by outgoing coach Galbraith.

Diehl, who swam for the Purdue squad from 1936 to 1939, began coaching immediately after graduation when he mentored the aquatic efforts of the Purdue freshmen. After a year with the Purdue frosh he moved to Oberlin College. The Diehl record at Oberlin included two undefeated seasons in three attempts.

The youthful coach, who arrived at Penn State last November, is hoping to build the team around the returning members of pre-war teams. With the material available still uncertain, however, he is unwilling to risk any predictions for success.

The swimming schedule is not yet complete, but Coach Diehl intends to have eight matches, including as opponents some of the leading teams of the East.

It was intended that Prof. Galbraith would help coach the tank squad in diving fundamentals, but the veteran counselor will be too busy with his work.

PSK, TKE, KS Triumph In IM Grid Encounters

Exhibiting well-knit offensives, Phi Sigma Kappa, Tau Kappa Epsilon, and Kappa Sigma defeated their opponents Monday night to enter second round play in the College Intramural Football Tournament.

Kappa Sigma's Bill Dingfelder garnered a pass from back Johnny Mull and crossed into the end zone, enabling his hard fighting team to edge a game Phi Kappa squad. In a fourth scheduled exhibition, Delta Sigma Phi forfeited to Tri-angel.

Physical Education Majors encounter the Hoopsters tonight in the finale of first round games. In other engagements, Phi Sigma Kappa meets Phi Delta Theta, Phi Lambda Phi vs. Alpha Chi Sigma, and Alpha Phi Delta vs. Sigma Phi Sigma.

Another close decision was dropped last week when Kings Point won 7 to 6.
