

Art Students Win Prizes For Projects

Prizes for the Student Union project recently on display at the Athletic Store will be awarded to five students at a mass meeting of the Student Union committee next Thursday morning. The winners, who will be presented with books, are Donald Horton, Robert Christensen, George Tillman, Arthur Lillian, and William Whitby.

The project was limited to architecture students of junior class standing or under. It lasted for five weeks or 75 class hours and was a more advanced type of work than usually given in this class.

A jury of faculty members and laymen judged the work for graduation day. Members of the jury were Professors Hajjar, Heidrich, Spanguolo, and Whitmore of the art department. They were assisted by Daniel Di Marino, George Donovan and Lawrence G. Foster.

The site chosen for the building was the land now occupied by the Woman's Building and the old Biology Laboratory. This location was decided upon because no spot has been definitely marked for the Student Union and this provided a central position.

Requirements for the project included a lobby, lounge, cafeteria, private dining rooms, snack bar, game rooms, aircraft workshops and hobby room, art and exhibition gallery, student government rooms, general meeting rooms, alumni office, barber and beauty shop, faculty floor, and overnight rooms for guests.

The work of the students on the projects was greatly appreciated by the Student Union committee, according to Lawrence G. Foster, chairman of the committee, and the cooperation of the art department and Professor Heidrich was invaluable.

Objectives of this Council, as announced by Dean Warnock, are the coordination of existing programs affecting the welfare and recreation of the student body, the initiation of new programs that may seem to be beneficial, and the employment of campus physical facilities to the fullest extent possible for student welfare and recreational use.

This Council is not intended to supplant nor lessen duties and agencies working in the welfare and recreational field, Warnock said.

It is primarily a coordinating agency and its members are largely administrators of divisions and departments related to these fields.

The Council will operate largely through committees set up for specific purposes. Within their assignments these committees will have large freedom of action.
