

Booters To Meet Orangemen

Jeffrey Men Make Bid For Undefeated Season

After two games on the road with Navy and Cornell, the Nittany booters return to New Beaver Field to tangle with an aggressive Syracuse eleven, 1:30 p. m. tomorrow.

Coach Jeffrey's soccer men will be seeking their fifth win in six starts, having tied Navy two weeks ago after the Middies knotted the contest in the final period on a "fluke" score.

SYRACUSE RECORD

Syracuse, coached for 21 seasons by Art Horrocks, will come to State with a 2 and 2 record. The New Yorkers won their opener from Cornell, 2-1, in the last few seconds of the game.

Cortland downed the Orangemen 6-3, and Colgate repeated the performance in a bitterly contested 2-1 tussle that nearly caused a riot at Hamilton. Last Saturday the Horrocks men bounced back into the win column with a 4-1 triumph over Ithaca College.

The visitors, with only three veteran players on the roster, are completing their first schedule since 1942. No Orange team was fielded during the war years of 1943, 1944 and 1945.

TWICE SCORED UPON

Penn State, scored upon only twice this season, will be gunning for its first undefeated record since 1940. The Lions were downed by Army 1-0 in 1941 to break their string of 65 consecutive games without defeat—a record garnered over a period of eight seasons.

Changes in the starting line-up of past games finds team captain Johnny Hamilton shifted to the inside left spot with Dean Witmer moving to inside right. Boyd Ethers, who suffered a sprained ankle against Navy, will probably start at his usual left halfback position. However, Jess Hartman may see plenty of action in Boyd's place if the Orangemen "rough" it.

GRAEBNER AT GOAL

Gene Graebner will safeguard the Nittany goal, with Bill Dietrich and Lloyd Black at the left and right fullback posts, respectively. Dean Hartman will start at right half.

Diminutive Timmy Petroff gets the nod for center half, with Paul Bender getting the outside right assignment. Ken Hosterman, Lion leading scorer, holds down the center position. Hackman completes the line-up at outside left.

ORANGE STARTERS

Dick Vyverberg, Orange stand-out, will protect the goal for the visitors. Tom captain Geschle will start at right fullback, with Rush or Turner at left fullback. Park gets the nod for right half, Tutty for center half, Weber at left half and Biesemeyer at outside right.

Mcwat, one of the Orange leading scorers, shifts from center to inside left, with Schillinger taking his place at center. Arnold begins at inside right and Smiley at outside left. Substitutes that may see action include Sessler, Biese, Cahill and Spring. Jimmy Walters will officiate.

Seventy Puck Candidates To Battle For Berths

With 70 candidates, 15 of which are Lion lettermen, fighting for a starting berth on Penn State's hockey team, the Blue and White may field its best squad this winter. Art Davis will continue as coach for the Lion puckmen.

A season schedule has not yet been completed, but games with Army, Cornell, Colgate and Georgetown have already been slated. Dick Yoder will be head manager for the hockey squad.

Bellefonte, State College High Schols To Tangle

Bellefonte and State College High Schools will tangle at New Beaver Field, 2 p. m. Monday, for their traditional football game in which the Old Iron Kettle is at stake.

Both teams have had fair seasons, and the two clubs will air their friendly rivalry which has been mellowed by 26 years of continuous playing.

Tickets for the game are on sale at the Commerce Club and Hoy's Drug Store, State College.

Delta Chi Eclipses IM Scoring Record; Routs Delta Tau Delta in 33-0 Triumph

Sparked by halfback "Pudge" Tompkins, the Delta Chi football squad established a record total of points as it humbled Delta Tau Delta 33-0 in the feature game of Wednesday night's competition. As in their previous two conquests, Tompkins spearheaded the offensive with his accurate aeri-als and impressive all-around play.

It was Delta Chi all the way, as this well-coordinated, smoothly functioning aggregation swept aside the opposition to advance into the fourth round of play. The half-time score read 19-0, with two additional touchdowns and extra points added in the second half.

DX SCORES

Within the first two minutes of play, Delta Chi had tallied twice, both via intercepted passes. Sherman and Halderman accounted for these tallies.

Tompkins tallied number three by running back a kick through the entire DTD team. And it was Tompkins again tossing the last two touchdowns, with Querns and Johnson on the receiving end.

Tau Kappa Epsilon edged Sigma Pi in a nip and tuck battle 7-6. The TKEs scored first as Dombrowski intercepted an aerial and raced to pay dirt. Dickson's pass to Stemler for the extra point proved all-important, as Sigma Pi's try for a tie failed after Von Neida's 88 yard runback of an intercepted pass.

AXS WIN

Alpha Chi Sigma eliminated a game Sigma Nu squad 13-6 to

maintain its winning streak and advance into round four. Again it was halfback Glenn Yeagley who starred on the offensive, and once more it was Mike Eneyart who demonstrated his prowess as a pass-receiver. This combination clicked for touchdown on the second play of the game.

Engle's interception of a Sigma Nu forward, followed by a lateral to Seavy effected the second and winning touchdown.

OVERTIME

The evening's final contest was a defensive struggle between Delta Upsilon and Phi Kappa Psi, with the DU's edging their opponents 1-0 in an overtime contest.

Following last night's play, five fraternity teams remain in the running for the trophy to be awarded by the College. Four independent squads have entered the semi-finals of the independent tourney, and following Monday and Tuesday's eliminations, Wednesday night will see the crowning of the champs.

In command of Penn State's film-making at football games are Ray Conger, one-time miler, and Nick Thiel, lacrosse coach.
