

Mitch Williams Wins Mid-Atlantic AAU Run

Penn State barrier ace Mitch Williams, wearing the colors of Overbrook A.A. of Philadelphia, captured the Middle Atlantic AAU junior cross country crown yesterday, in the 35th annual running of the event.

Twenty-three year old Williams, a sophomore, covered the 6,000 meter course in 11 minute, 27 seconds to outpace a field of 48 cindersmen. Second place went to John St. Clair, Jr., representing Nativity C. C. of Philadelphia, who crossed the finish mark a second behind Williams.

Delta Gamma's foster child is a black-haired Belgian girl named Mariette Jans. Mariette, and her family were bombed out of their home and shelters three times during the war, leaving both of her parents homeless. When the Plan learned that the family was homeless and injured, they took Mariette and her younger sister to their Gellie Colony where they will be kept until their parents are physically and financially able to care for them.

Besides receiving clothing and food at the Colony, the two girls each month receive a box of toys, goodies, and clothing and letters from the Delta Gamma sisters.

Zeta Tau Alpha has adopted Antje Heesterman, a little Dutch girl of 11, under the Foster Parents' Plan. Oldest of six children, Antje is receiving clothing as well as money from the Zetas. Her father was an active member of the underground movement until he was seized by the Gestapo and deported for slave labor. He died, and Antje and her mother were left with the responsibility of caring for the five younger children.

Seven Filipino orphans in Mindanao whose parents were killed by the Japanese, are also being assisted by the Zetas. Lucia Trevers, 13 and the eldest, wrote to Jane Doner, student at the College whose father is stationed in Mindanao. Lucia asked for help and now she is receiving it.
