WASHINGTON—The White House topped off a busy executive day by disclosing that General George Marshall has been summoned home from China. The wartime Army Chief of Staff will report on the disturbed Chinese situation. Newsmen sought some amplification of the announcement in vain. The only further information was that General Marshall probably will leave Nanking tomorrow on orders from President Truman.

WASHINGTON—President Truman went before the Republican 80th Congress in a smiling and conciliatory mood. He proposed a general program aimed at outlawing jurisdictional strikes and continuing the high wartime and post-war taxes along with other legislation calling for improvements in minimum wages, the farm program, health insurance, refugee immigration and civil rights legislation. Even as the President urged the continuance of the special wartime excise taxes, however, a bill was hurried before Congress to end them immediately. The presidential labor proposals appeared likely to be received more favorably.

WASHINGTON—The War Department meanwhile confirmed word of a shake-up in the Army's European command. Lieutenant General Lucius Clay now becomes the top American commander in Europe. General Clay disclosed in Berlin that he is moving his head-

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Noel Injured In Auto Crash

Joseph Michael Noel, sixth semester student at the College, is recovering in Altoona Mercy Hospital from fractures of both legs received in an automobile accident December 21 while enroute home for the holidays.

The accident occurred on a snow-covered, icy route 36, one mile south of Altoona, when Noel left the car in which he was riding with William Berringer, seventh semester student, to wipe snow from the windshield. While he was cleaning the windshield, the car was struck from behind by an automobile driven by Donald G. Perry, also a student at the College.

The impact of the crash hurled Noel onto the hood of a car approaching from the opposite direction, driven by Sylvester McCall, 37, of Bloomsburg, a traveling salesman.

Noel, retaining consciousness all the while, was placed on the floor of the back seat in Berringer's car and driven to the Altoona hospital. Examination showed that Noel suffered a double fracture of the right leg and a compound fracture of the left leg, which a hospital doctor said would take at least a year to heal.

A pre-law student, Noel originally entered the College in the summer of '44 under the Navy V-12 program. After four semesters he went into the regular Navy. He returned to the College as a civilian last Fall.

McDowell Struck; Witnesses Called

Mrs. Marion McDowell, associate professor of home economics, was struck by a truck and severely injured. The accident took place at the corner of College avenue and Pugh street December 16 about 5 p.m.

It is expected that Mrs. McDowell will be hospitalized for approximately six months as the result of a broken vertebra. Witnesses of the accident are asked to contact Dr. H. L. Krall, mathematics department, or call 891.

With reference to a proposed traffic light at the corner of College avenue and Allen streets, Chief Juba said the Council was working on that and other improvements.

Dr. H. G. Canady Begins Lectures

Dr. Herman G. Canady, head of the department of psychology, West Virginia State College, will speak on "The Differences Among Peoples of the World" tonight at 8 p. m. in Room 121, Sparks Building. He will be introduced by Dr. Ben Burwema, dean of the School of the Liberal Arts.

The lecture, which is open to the public, is one of a series of appearances that Dr. Canady is making at the College this week. Today he addresses the School of Education faculty. He also will speak in sociology, psychology, and rural sociology classes and will meet with individual students and faculty members.

Dr. Canady has taught for 18 years at West Virginia State College, was a Rosenwald Fellow in 1939-41, and is a member of the Society of the Sigma Xi. He received his bachelor of arts, master of arts, and doctor of philosophy degrees from Northwestern University.

His appearance is sponsored by the American Friends Service Committee, an organization that makes available to schools and colleges, visiting lecturers and teachers of the Negro race who are recognized leaders in their specific fields of learning. Local sponsors are the department of psychology, the division of sociology, and the Penn State Christian Association.

Time of an examination may not be changed without the written approval of the head of the department and the dean of the school in which the subject is taught.

Graduating seniors are not exempt from final examinations.

Timetables for the spring semester are expected to be ready to go on sale about January 15 in the Armory.

Prof Receives Civilian Award

Harold P. Zelko, on leave of absence from his position as assistant professor of public speaking at the College, has been awarded the meritorious civilian award and commendation for meritorious civilian service, it was announced today by the War Department.

Zelko, since May, 1944, has served as assistant chief of training in the Office of the Chief Engineers in Washington.

The citation for the award reads:

"For exemplary performance and devotion to duty in the Office of the Chief Engineers. His initiative, knowledge, and skill in assuming responsibility for details of management in the Training Section, and editing, preparing and collaborating in the preparation of materials contributed to the advancement of the training program and its application in the Federal Service."

Windcrest, Circle Dorms Get Special Fire Signals

A special fire signal, two long blasts from the whistle at the College power plant, has been set up for announcing fires in Windcrest or Pollock Circle, veteran communities on the campus.
