The 1947 Lion baseball team will go South in early April to play Virginia Military Institute and Washington and Lee, according to the 21-game schedule announced recently by Neil M. Flouning, graduate manager of athletics.

Enroute to Virginia, the Nittany Lions will stop at Philadelphia to play the University of Pennsylvania in the season's opener on April 5. Four games are booked with the University of Pittsburgh, and two each with West Virginia, Georgetown, and Syracuse.

Lion Rifle Team, ROTC Squad Compete

In three postal matches fired last week, the varsity rifle team lost to Michigan State and State University of Iowa but won a forfeit from Drexel Institute of Technology.

The R.O.T.C. team won three out of four matches with wins over Iowa, Michigan State and Ohio University R.O.T.C. teams. The only loss was to Presbyterian College.

Captain Ken Yount led the varsity team with a 383 total while Max Cleveland took second in the varsity shooting and first for the ROTC match.

Michigan State fired a 1864 total to top Penn State's 1863 while Iowa, firing from only three positions, posted a 1396 score to defeat the Lions with a 1380 count in the varsity match.

Penn State ROTC marksmen fired a score of 1835 while Iowa turned in 1830, Michigan State 1818 and Ohio University 1795.

Thurston Wins Meet

Hank Thurston, president of the Penns Valley Ski Club, won the Max Dercum Trophy when he took first place in the annual meet at Boalsburg over the weekend to determine the Club's outstanding skier.

Max Dercum, former ski coach at the College and father of skiing in this region, set the giant slalom for the event.

The course was laid on the bottom portion of the Big Dipper Trail where snow conditions were excellent for the race.

ENTHUSIASTS WATCH

A crowd of approximately 100 snow-starved enthusiasts gathered at the steepest point on the course to watch a number of exciting spills and some fine exhibitions of controlled skiing.

On this portion of the run, Thurston gained time to give him first place as he flashed through the control flags with scarcely any decrease in speed.

The other skiers were either checking speed before the flags or going into them too fast and ending up in the woods.

Thurston's winning time was 55 seconds, which gave him a 1.2 second advantage over George Quimby, who came in second. Dercum equaled Quimby's time in opening the meet as a non-competitive fore-runner.

Max Peters was up to his excellent standard as he snaked down the mountain side to take third place. He was followed by Herb Wahl.

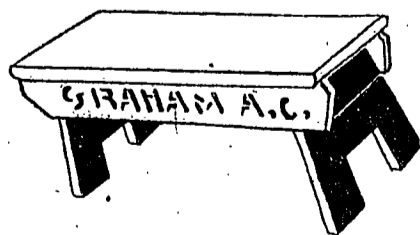
