One of the very few tournaments to utilize the cross-exami-nation style of debate, the Shippensburg meet will place each competing unit in six matches.


In former years the number of matches was eight, and in win-ning the last tourney, the men's squad compiled a record of six won and two lost, numbering among its victims, the women's team of the College.
