"Skylark", no matter how presented, is not first-class theatre but, as presented by Players it is good popular entertainment.

The lighting was good, as was the "between the facts" music. This show was directed in the style so successfully used by George Abbott in his shows. The style may be explained thus: no matter what, the actors keep moving. They pause only for cigarettes, a kiss, or, perhaps, a gulp of whiskey.

There were three fine performances. Jo Peoples combined dignity, warmth, and an excellent sense of comedy to give a performance that can only be called

superb. She created a believable and understandable character, yet she never lost her light touch.

Irving Feldsott had a crispness and a subtlety that made his performance stand out. Harry Natz-

chke was very funny as the deadpan butler.

Herrnan Piven was adequate and agreeable, but he lacked the excellent comic talent and the clearly drawn character which

marked each of the three performances mentioned above. But he had considerable energy and shows much promise.

Most of the others were so intent on being natural that they

stopped being characters and became almost cardboard cutouts. Nevertheless, intimacy, and arena staging notwithstanding, the theatre is still the theatre—eh, Stanislavski?

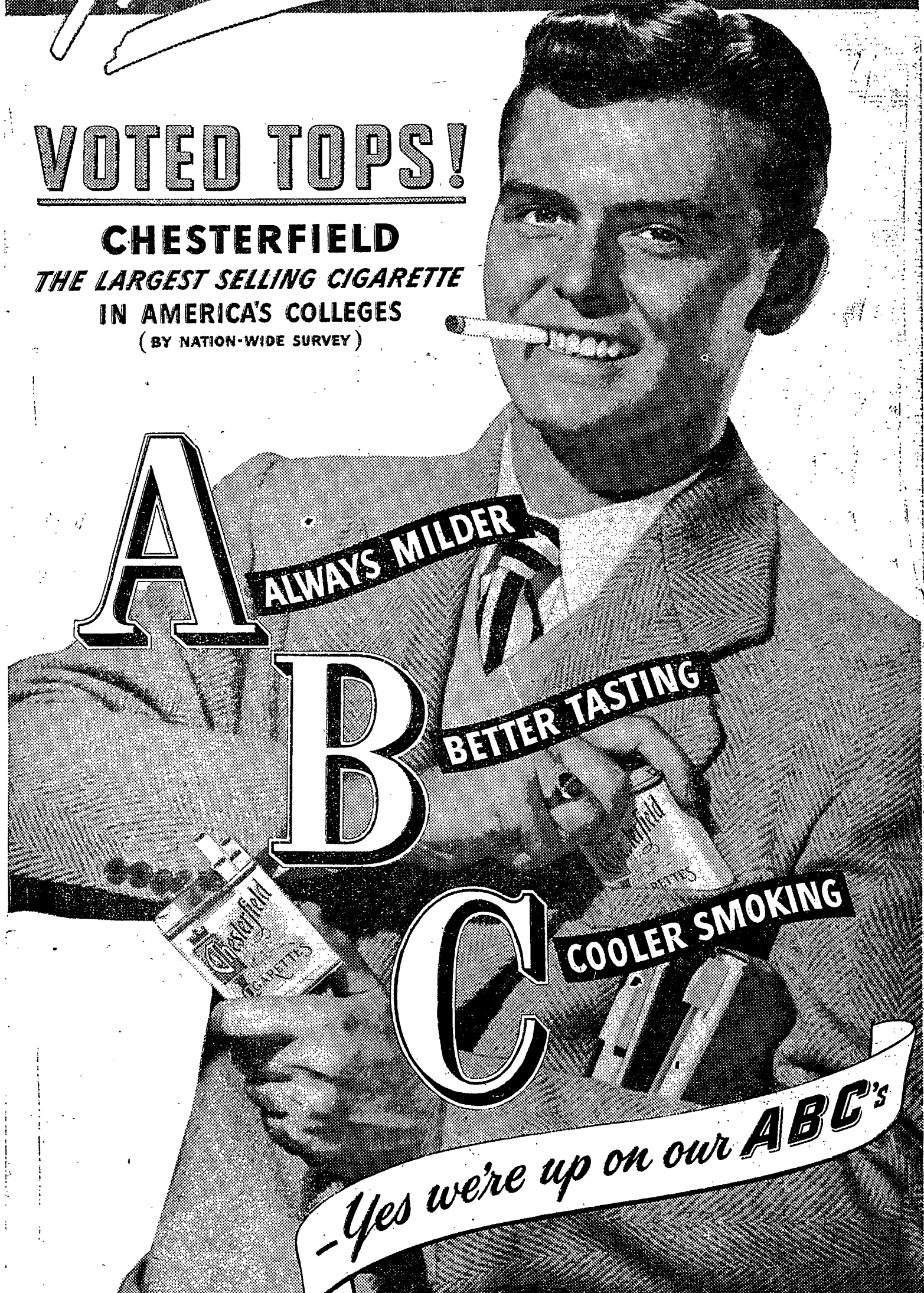
