

Mortar Board Extends Drive

Campaigns to sponsor a school in France and to provide clothing for European families are being continued this week by Mortar Board, senior women's honorary, and Alpha Rho Omega, Russian honorary.

Joan Harrington, president of the women's society, said that between \$150 and \$500 is required by the Save the Children Federation in order to establish a school. Contributions will be collected by Mortar Board, Miss Harrington said.

The American's sense of world citizenship has been demonstrated by Europeans by the 1200 schools the Federation has already set up, said Rev. W. I. Reed, associate director of the Foundation.

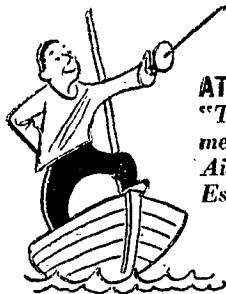
