

# Hawthorne Wins NCAA Boxing Title

## Lion Champion Defeats Wisconsin's Miyagawa; Cassidy Out Early; Tighe Loses in Semi-Finals

Miyagawa, in his second fight this year against Hawthorne, led with a wicked left in the first round and puzzled the Penn Stater for a while. A stiff right opened the Badger's cut near the end of the first round and Hawthorne worked on it effectively until the fight was stopped by Referee Joe August and attending medical officials.

Hawthorne defeated Harold Brown, a rugged slugger from Minnesota, in the semi-final round with the Lion boxer piling up points on good jabs and clever work on the in-fighting.

The EIBA champ defeated Bob Thomasian, southpaw from Kings Point Merchant Marine base, in the preliminaries.

Hawthorne joins four other Lion boxers in winning a NCAA title including Dave Stoop, Al Lewis, Frank Goodman and Paul Scally. He is the only boxer to win the 130-pound title as the division was moved up from 127 pounds last year.

Captain Tighe took Colin Connell of Minnesota on a two-round decision in the preliminaries when the bout was stopped by a cut over the Minnesotan's right eye.

Wayne Fontes, champion from San Jose State, stopped Tighe in the second round of the semi-final bout with a left hook that sent the EIBA champ to the canvas for a count of nine. An earlier left hook had opened a cut on Tighe's nose.

Fontes lost to John Lendenski of Wisconsin in the finals.

Jim Cassidy drew a bye in the preliminaries and lost to a fast-moving, aggressive Bill Williams of Idaho in a decision bout.

## Runners Trail In Weekend Meets

Forest Efav and Gil Dodds pounded home in front of Penn State's Stone and Karver twice over the weekend—at the Columbian meets in Kansas City, Friday night, and then at the Chicago Daily News meets Saturday.

In losing to Dodds in Chicago, Karver forced the flying parson to his fastest indoor mile since he set the record at 4:06.4 in 1944. Dodds was clocked at 4:06.8. Karver's second place time was 4:12.8.

Running in the Knight, of Columbus meets Friday night, the Penn State relay team finished third behind NYU and Fordham. Relay-men Ashenfelter and Williams stopped the clock at 1:58 to record their best times to date.

Barney Ewell finished third in the Chicago 50-yard dash behind Bill Mathis of Illinois. According to Coach Chick Werner, Mathis jumped the gun, and Ewell began his race at a trot, waiting for the event to be re-started.

# Nittany Wrestlers Lose Early

Blue and White grapplers Jim Mohnney, Ernie Closser, and Grant Dixon found competition at the National Intercollegiate Wrestling Tourney held at Champaign, Illinois, this past weekend considerably stiffer than they'd experienced at the Easters with each of the trio bowing out in first round matches.

Wrestling-famed Cornell College

of Iowa gained the team crown, as Iowa State Teachers and the Oklahoma Aggies placed second and third.

Mohnney, who had brought the Eastern 128-pound championship back to Penn State two weeks ago, contested in the 136-pound class in this meet, and was decisively by Bauer of Oklahoma A. and M., 7-2. Eligible for a consolation bout since Bauer, following further competition, had advanced into a final berth, Mohnney again went down, this time on a decision to Michigan State's Thomason.

Ernie Closser, pinned by Snook of Cornell in a preliminary tussle, returned in a consolation match to best Wilson of Wheaton College. Navy's Fletcher, Eastern 145-pound king, eliminated Closser, however, in a second consolation bout. Koll, of Iowa State Teachers, was the tourney's 145-pound champ.

Penn State's 155-pounder, Grant Dixon, was eliminated in his first round match by Jim Wilkinson of Indiana, and did not compete in a consolation contest.

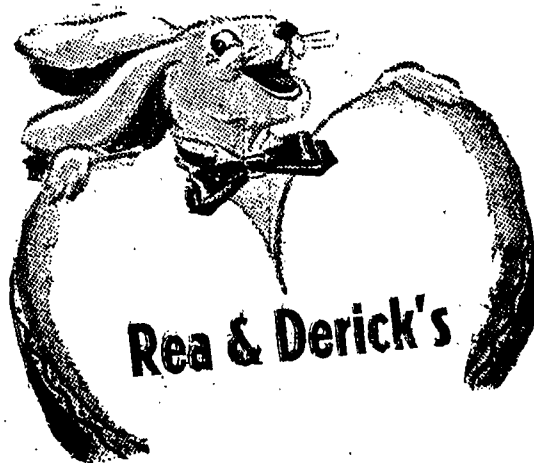
