Ridenour Defeats Hauser For 121-Pound Championship

Charlie Ridenour, three-time Eastern Intercollegiate wrestling chambion while an undergraduate at Penn State, appeared slated for a berth on the 1948 Olympic team by virtue of his victory in the National AAU chambionships at San Francisco Saturday.

The former Lion grappler beat George Hauser of Cornell Col-

lege, Iowa, 9-6 in the finals.

Ridenour, who had recently walked off with the Metropolitan and New York state AAU titles, stopped a winning streak of Hauser's at 87. He is the 1947 National Intercollegiate champion at 121 pounds.

Another former Penn State wrestler—Bob Morgan—placed third in the heavyweight division at San Francisco. Morgan had previously won the New York
AAU title and placed third in the
National junior AAU championships before competing on the
West Coast.

Both grapplers—now graduate students at the College—will continue working out under the colors of the New York A.C. for the coming Olympics in London in

For Ridenour, the NAAU title was the culmination of a long line of victories on the mat. Coming to Coach Charlie Spiedel's team fresh from a high school cham-nour won the Eastern Intercollepionship at State College, Ridegiate crowns at 121 pounds in 1941 and 1942 and again in 1943, this time at 128 pounds.
