Labor Pioneers

The College appears to be placing its bets on education, not legislation, for results in labor-management relations.

Credit for pioneering in union sponsored steel labor institutes with summer sessions for its leaders goes to the College. The first to hold the courses last year, eight universities have followed the College with like institutes.

According to Anthony Luchek, labor expert at the College, many letters received from workers who attended the institute last summer boil down to two things. The workers got a broader outlook on their jobs. With a new understanding of industry they believe they can avoid many strikes and other difficulties.

Also in step with labor education, the College is initiating an industrial relations curriculum this fall. J.N.A.

Some Protested

Protesting circles formed this week around lists posted in women's living units which said, according to regulation 11, that there will be no unchaperoned dating in fraternity houses during the summer session.

Special permissions may be obtained for chaperoned week-end social events from the Dean of Women or the Dean of Men. Contrary to the consensus, the regulation is not a new one, but a continuation of a ruling set in previous years. Its reason is obvious. Interfraternity Council which revivates fraternity dating does not function in the summer. Most fraternity officers who are responsible for dating regulations in their own houses are not on campus.

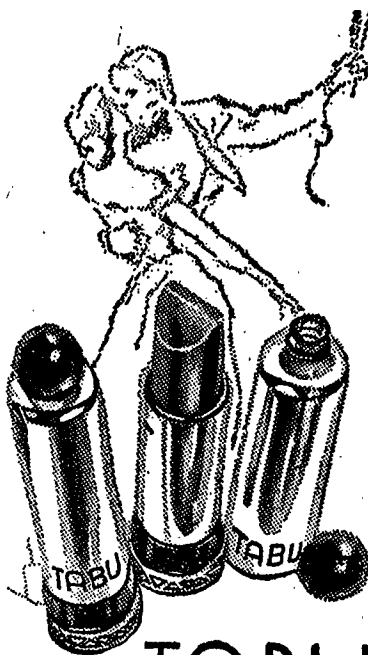
