Higginsmen After 2nd Win In 37th Meeting of Two Teams

The Nittany Lion of Penn State will roar for the second time this season as it meets its traditional rivals, the Bucknell Bisons, in the home opener at New Beaver Field tomorrow afternoon before an expected capacity crowd of 16,000.

Game time at 2 p.m. will see 22 gridiron warriors, the Blue and White on one side and the Orange and Blue on the other, get ready to battle for their colors for the 37th time.

The Thundering Herd from Bucknell are the oldest rivals in the history of Penn State football. These two teams first met in 1881, and in their 36 meetings, the Lions have come off the field victors 25 times. Bucknell scored its last win, a 14-0 conquest in 1938.

Bucknell coach, Harry Lawrence, has brought from their home stamping grounds a traveling squad of 40 burly Bisons. Most of these are new faces which grace the gridiron picture at Lewisburg.

With at least 16 key performers, most of them linemen, missing from last season's squad, the all-new coaching staff will be relying upon the steady influence of 18 lettermen in seeking to wield a winning ball club.

THIRTEEN '46 HOLDOVERS
Thirteen of the present lettermen are holdovers from the 1946 campaign, while the remaining five won their monograms in earlier seasons. Add to this group a dozen graduates from junior varsity ranks and a handful of

newcomers to the Bison scene, and you have the 1947 Bucknell team.

The greatest rebuilding job of all took place in the forward wall, where both sets of first-string guards and tackles from the past year graduated.
