

## Wernermen Hosts to NYU Soccermen Tackle Colgate Raiders

A battle of champions will take place tomorrow at one o'clock when the National IC-4A champions, New York University, and the second place winner, Penn State, clash in a cross-country meet starting on the New Beaver Field track.

With both teams boasting nationally famous runners, the meet is expected to draw a large crowd of cross-country and track enthusiasts.

Unlike other sports, the low score wins in a cross-country run. Starting in front of the west stands of the football field, the harrisers head toward the golf course, make two laps of the finish line in front of the starting stance.

The five-mile race and crosses the finish line first scores one point for his team, the second place winner two, etc. Only the first five men from each team qualify for the score.

Six cross-country veterans, Gerry Karver, Horace Ashenfelter, Mitch Williams, "Pappy" Longenecker, Fred Lennox, and Ike Evans, plus six newcomers to the squad, Al Vigilante, John Bates, Lou Nicastro, Bob Auman, Bob Handwerk, and Dave Huber will represent the Lions in this initial encounter.

## Soccermen Tackle Colgate Raiders

Penn State's soccer team will be gunning for its second win of the season when seventeen Lion booters face off against the Red Raiders of Colgate in Hamilton, N. Y., at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon.

Fresh from a 3-0 victory over Bucknell last Saturday, the Jeffreymen will be pointing for a repeat performance of last year's 5-1 win over the New York turfmen.

Starting for the Lions in the forward positions will be lanky Ted Lieb at outside left, Bill Shellenberger at inside left, Ken Hosterman at center forward, Dean Witmer at inside right, and Fred Kretzer at outside right. Hal Hackman, Will Kraybill and Pete Buzad will make the trip as relief men for the starting forwards.

At the halfback posts, Jeffrey is standing pat on last week's trio of Dean Hartman at right half, Ralph Hosterman at center half, and Jack Campbell on the left, with Dick Hanna standing by.

Rugged Jim Klein gets the nod at right fullback flanked by hard working Dave Binns on his left. Frank Tauscher and Charlie Margolf will substitute at the deep defensive slots, and goalie Gene Graebner will round out the Lion contingent.
