College Develops Turkey Steaks

Turkey steaks, a new product being developed through agricultural research at the College, were prepared and eaten as part of a demonstration of Prof. P. H. Margolf, of the poultry husbandry faculty.

The meat featured the meeting of the Connecticut Turkey Growers at Storrs, Conn., where Professor Margolf appeared twice on the program.

Preparation of the turkey steaks were part of the morning program at which Professor Margolf discussed methods of preparing large turkeys for market. At the afternoon session, he spoke on the economics of turkey production based on some of his studies here.

Three different types of turkey steaks have been produced experimentally in the studies under way at the College.

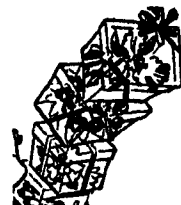

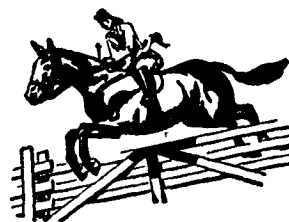
