## No Rent Decrease For Circle Dorms

The Federal Public Housing Authority will not permit a decrease in rent for Pollock Circle dormitories, said Harold Loman, Director of Dormitories and Dining Commons, due to the rise in food prices since last May.

Mr. Loman made this statement to a group representing the Pollock Circle Council when they questioned him Friday concerning the seemingly high living cost of the Circle.

At the request of the Circle Council, Mr. Loman and Frank Morris, assistant to the Treasurer, had lunch in the Circle dining common that day "to see for themselves" the conditions which are the source of so many complaints.

Since last year's receipts from Pollock Circle residents were greater than the expenses, Mr. Loman added, he attempted to have the room rent lowered. However, the F.P.H.A., which controls similar units throughout the nation, would not okay the decrease.

He went on to say that the College sends all money in excess of expenditures to the government, and cannot buy new articles for the dormitories except to replace worn out items, he said.

Acting as hosts for Messrs. Loman and Morris were James MacCallum, Council president; Donald Mitchell, vice-president; Leo Shellchock, chairman of the health and sanitation committee; Thomas Reissmann, resident counselor; and Edward Wallace.
