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not require dormitory accommodations but can reside at their homes.

Colleges during the next decade, Avirett predicted, will place greater emphasis on administration, partly because of increased responsibilities for students while out of the classroom. He also predicted greater emphasis would be placed on good teaching, as against pre-occupation with research, and he visualized a greater realization of the need for public understanding which is essential for public support.

Howard C. Petersen, executive vice-president of the Fidelity-Philadelphia Trust Company and until recently Assistant Secretary of War, urged adoption of the universal military training program.

"Until there is a 180-degree change in Kremlin foreign policy, absolutely no dependence can be placed in the United Nations to prevent war," Petersen warned. He added that he did not believe war is inevitable.

Explaining that universal military training is necessary for an adequate security system, Petersen pointed out that it would be only a part of a balanced integrated program.

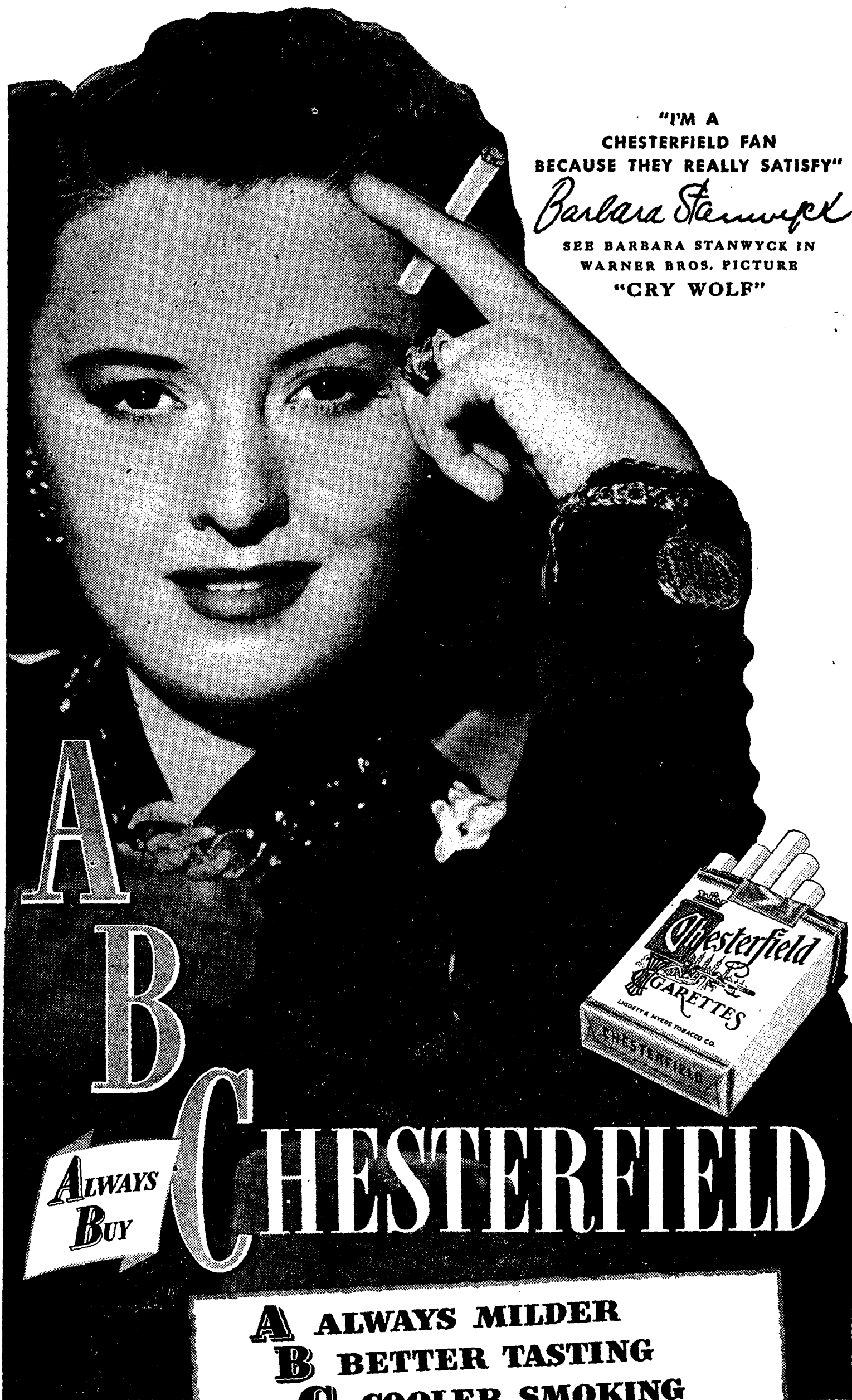
"It must be coupled with effective industrial mobilization plans, an alert, world-wide intelligence system, an up-to-the-minute program for scientific research and development which enlists the assistance of the best scientific minds in this country, and a virile

hard-hitting striking force in being," Petersen said. At the afternoon business session, Herbert L. Spencer, presi-
