arts and sciences and will preside for all divisional meetings. Among speakers to address this division will be Harry P. Hammond, Dean of the School of Engineering at the College, who will discuss "Contributions of the schools of liberal arts to the training of engineers."

In addition, Dean Hammond will address the division of engineering on "How can humanistic-social courses be more effective in the education of engineers?" The division of engineering will also sponsor a symposium on engineering extension activities at which Prof. Edward L. Keller will discuss administrative and financial policies.

Dr. Grace M. Henderson, head of the department of home economics, is on a joint committee with the American Vocational Association for the convention.

J. Orvis Keller, assistant to the president, is a member of a special committee on short curricula in land-grant institutions.

Dr. Fred F. Lininger, director of the Pennsylvania agricultural experiment station at the College, will attend several meetings of experiment station directors.

J. Martin Fry, director of the agricultural extension service, and Miss Lydia Tarrant, in charge of home economics extension, will attend the meetings of

extension groups and assist at the national meeting of Epsilon Sigma Phi, national honorary extension fraternity. Dean Lyman E. Jackson of the

School of Agriculture, former secretary of the Land-Grant Association, is principal speaker at the fraternity's banquet. Members of the Pennsylvania chapter

will be official hosts for this event.

Adam H. Imhof, assistant agricultural experiment station editor, has been named chairman of

a committee of agricultural college editors to assist in covering the land-grant sessions for the newspapers, magazines, and radio stations.

### Centers Estimate Spring Assignees

Reports from the undergraduate centers at Altoona and Pottsville show that approximately 242 students will come to the campus at the beginning of the spring semester, said Robert E. Galbraith, veterans' counselor, today. Of this number, Altoona will send 166 and Pottsville will send 76.

"The percentage of married students will hold to its present mark of 20 to 25 per cent when the new assignees arrive in February, since 45 of the students at the Centers are married," said Galbraith. In the married group 16 have one child each and three have two children each. Galbraith also said that 70 per cent of the assignees are veterans.
